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Letter from Secretary Browning.

Publicity has been given to an important letter from Hon. O. H. Browning, Secretary of the Interior, which was written to some of his forrmer constituents in Illinois in which, it is stated, on being submitted to the President, he fully approved and desired to be made public, with the understanding that it fully represented his present position.
