Revenue Decisions.-When a deed is made for real estate and sold for taxes after time of redemption is past, it must contain a recital of the facts, and the form must be in accordance with the laws of the State in which the real estate is situated on the subject of sales under execution. #### Removals in Louisiana-Yellow Fever.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16. Special Order No. 162 removes the Sheriff and Clerk of the 4th Judicial District Court, Parish of St. Landry, for being obstacles to reconstruction, and appoints others to fill their places. The same order removes the council of the city of Jefferson for passing an ordinance for election of city officers, in violation of Special Orders No. 7, current series.

There were 28 deaths from yellow fever to-day. At the present rate of decrease, it will soon cease to be an epidemic.

Important Decision.

Judge Bryan, of the U. S. Court, in a case today testing the validity of panel of a jury drawn of voters or tax payers, irrespective of color, decided that, although the act of Congress of 1840 required the jurors to be drawn as prescribed by the Legislature of each respective State, yet that this must be construed in reference to the changes BY TELEGRAPH, created by the war. He held that Congress, as now constituted, was the legal Congress of the whole country; that the Reconstruction Act of Congress conferred suffrage on the negro and was the provisional constitution and law of the State. He held that President Johnson had no power to restore any seceding State to the Union.

Meigs, clerk, leave to-morrow for Richmond, where they will remain a couple of days; thence, via Lynchburg and Knoxville, to Atlanta, Chattanooga and Nashville; or they may go from Richmond to Savannah and thence via Macon to Atlanta.
