

From Washington. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. Col. Gilbert, who was implicated in destroying an Arkansas Printing office, has been fined one thousand dollars and reduced to Captain; taking rank at the foot of the list. The New York Times concludes an editorial with these words: But we are inclined to think that the Northern States will not surrender their own rights quite so complacently as they have consented to the overthrow of those of the South. Mr. Mansfield, President of the Vicksburg Packet Company, has a contract for a semi-weekly mail between Vicksburg and New Orleans, for twenty-five thousand dollars, with the privilege of a tri-weekly, at thirty thousand dollars at the option of the Department. The foregoing contractors will be prosecuted for failures.

Cable Summary. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. Great activity prevails in London, at the Naval Arsenal. Garibaldi has issued another address, urging the Italian nation to arm. Mazzini has issued a manifesto, urging the patriots of Rome, to rise and proclaim a Republic. Skirmishing, in the Papal Territory, is still going on. Reports conflicting, both sides claiming advantages. No very important conflicts have occurred. Menotti Garibaldi drove the Papal troops into Monte Maggiore. The Garibaldians, who took the road to Mentone, to liberate him, were driven away.

OUR NIGHT REPORTS. An Effort to Revive the Democratic Party in this State. RALEIGH, Oct. 16. Strenuous efforts are being made by influential leading men to revive the old Democratic party, for the purpose of co-operating and encouraging the Northern Democracy in their endeavors to defeat Radicalism. Some of the most prominent men in the State are moving spirits in the effort. From all appearances, the movement bids fair to succeed. All the elements of Conservatism rejoice in the triumphs of the Democracy in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

From Washington. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. Seventy-four million, sixty-nine thousand coin interest on five-twentieths due payable first of November. Receipts from Revenue to-day were \$272,000. James W. Hancock has been appointed Collector of Customs at St. Louis, Texas, vice Charles Taylor, deceased. Senator Nye will stump New York in behalf of the Radicals. The Inquest evidence over the victims of the riot at Springfield, Massachusetts, shows that the State constables fired into the crowd after the riot had been subdued. Six hundred Brooklyn new shop-keepers are reported for violations of the revenue laws. Revenue Decisions.—When a deed is made for real estate and sold for taxes after time of redemption is past, it must contain a recital of the facts, and the form must be in accordance with the laws of the State in which the real estate is situated on the subject of sales under execution. Sugar cane is a farm product, but sugar is not. A person who manufactures sugar to an amount exceeding \$1,000 per annum, pays special tax, though the cane producing the sugar be made on his own farm. A dispatch from Vicksburg says there have been no deaths for the past forty-eight hours. The President has not ordered or requested the attendance of District Commanders here. The picture of two children feeding a horse held at the dead letter office, was claimed to-day. The claimants say that the loss of the picture was more deeply felt than that of all their property swept away by the war. The claimants reside in Columbia, S. C. Mr. Zevely, Third Assistant Postmaster General, at whose instance the notice was telegraphed, will restore the picture at once.

Removals in Louisiana—Yellow Fever. NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16. Special Order No. 162 removes the Sheriff and Clerk of the 4th Judicial District Court, Parish of St. Landry, for being obstacles to reconstruction, and appoints others to fill their places. The same order removes the council of the city of Jefferson for passing an ordinance for election of city officers, in violation of Special Orders No. 7, current series. There were 28 deaths from yellow fever to-day. At the present rate of decrease, it will soon cease to be an epidemic.

Important Decision. Judge Bryaa, of the U. S. Court, in a case to-day testing the validity of panel of a jury drawn of voters or tax payers, irrespective of color, decided that, although the act of Congress of 1840 required the jurors to be drawn as prescribed by the Legislature of each respective State, yet that this must be construed in reference to the changes created by the war. He held that Congress, as now constituted, was the legal Congress of the whole country; that the Reconstruction Act of Congress conferred suffrage on the negro and was the provisional constitution and law of the State. He held that President Johnson had no power to restore any seceding State to the Union. He says: I say it with a grave sense of responsibility, it was not competent for the President, by any act of his, to bind Congress and restore the State to the Union and connect it with it, by Constitutional ligaments and relations. He held there was no legal government or State Constitution in South Carolina, and under the existing provisional government the reconstruction acts of Congress were the supreme law and the Constitution of the State. He says if there was any Constitution in South Carolina, or any legal State Government, then the act of 1840, commanding the Judge to accept jurors alone those who are voters under the Constitution of the State and who are qualified by the act of its Legislature, would be decisive of this question, and the panel should have been drawn alone of white men; but it is otherwise.

Southern Railroads. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. The House committee to enquire into Southern Railroads, and to arrive at an equitable adjustment of railroad indebtedness to the government, consisting of J. W. McClury, chairman, Ulysses Mercer, F. Sawyer and General Washburn, accompanied by F. G. Ordway, Sergeant at arms of the House of Representatives, S. D. Lloyd, messenger, and Capt. F. P. Meigs, clerk, leave to-morrow for Richmond, where they will remain a couple of days; thence, via Lynchburg and Knoxville, to Atlanta, Chattanooga and Nashville; or they may go from Richmond to Savannah and thence via Macon to Atlanta.

From Richmond. RICHMOND, Oct. 16. The nominations of Marmaduke Johnson, N. V. Sturdivant, Wm. Taylor, Thomas J. Evans and A. H. Sands, gives satisfaction to Conservatives, and the ticket will be well supported. The moderate Republicans, with Dr. Sharp, brother-in-law of General Grant, at the head, and Fields Cook, mulatto preacher, at the tail, also meets with favor, but the Conservative ticket spoils its effect. It is thought the best men from both may be taken to make a compromise. The ladies of the Oakwood Memorial Association are holding a bazaar to raise funds for the graves of Confederate dead in that cemetery. It is very successful. The State Horticultural and Pomological Exhibition is now being held. The hall is crowded to-night with the first people of the city to hear Gen. Wise, who made a powerful speech of two hours. Dr. Alexander Sharp, brother-in-law of Gen. Grant and Postmaster in this city, will publish a card in to-morrow's Dispatch, positively declining the nomination tendered by moderate Republicans for the Convention. Col. Chalfin, in a letter to the Registrar of Culpeper county, explains that only persons who are entitled to register under the law are eligible to the Convention, as delegates. A person who was a clerk of a County Court before the war, and as such, took oath to support the Constitution of the United States and afterwards engaged in rebellion, is not eligible to the Convention.

Cable Dispatches. LONDON, Oct. 16. There is a wild rumor that the Fenians are planning an attempt to seize the Queen at Balmoral, and the Household Guard has been doubled. FLORENCE, Oct. 16. The Papal troops are falling back on Rome. PARIS, Oct. 16. It is reported that Spain has tendered Napoleon assistance in sustaining the temporal power of the Pope. Napoleon and Eugenie have arrived at St. Cloud.
