THE WILMINGTON AND MANCHESTER RAILROAD.—We clip the following from an exchange, believing it to be of much interest to a large class of our readers. The claims of the United States against Great Britain for the Alabama losses having created a counter claim for the indemnity of Confederate bond holders, the cotton bonds have a value of about twenty-five per cent. upon their face, and we presume it is upon this basis that it is proposed to exchange them for the Railroad bonds.

The Wilmington and Manchester Railroad Company of North Carolina have put a loan upon the London market of \$200,000 sterling. Security, 100,000 of their first and 100,000 of their second mortgage bonds. They offer to sell them at seventy-five cents, and will accept payment either in all cash or fifty cents in cash and twenty-five cents Confederate States cotton bonds, ex-overdue coupons, at twenty-five cents on the dollar.
