THE CITY.

A STAVELESS BARREL.—There was on exhibition in the Chamber of Commerce, yesterday morning, one of May's Patent Staveless Barrels, manufactured by the Manhattan Barrel Company of New York. It is made of strips of white pine veneering laid transversely across each other, and glued together firmly until the thickness of an inch is obtained. The head is mortised in, and secured by an oak hoop on the outside, the whole painted, and a bung hole with an iron screw bung, made in the head instead of in the side. It presents more the appearance of a large tobacco drum than of a barrel. The inventor claims that it does not leak a drop, and that great advantage is obtained in stowing a vessel. They are not offered for sale in this market, but we understand they cost about five dollars in New York.

EXPEDITION.—On Tuesday, we ordered, per mail, from Baltimore, a lot of paper for our Job Department, with instructions to ship it by the "Seaboard Inland Air Line." Yesterday morning, the paper, in three very large cases, was delivered at our office, being just ten minutes behind the invoice, which was sent by mail. We have patronized this line frequently since its organization; and, with a single exception, our goods have come through with the utmost expedition. Now and then we hear merchants complain of some little detention of goods; but this must be expected occasionally, whether the goods be sent by Express, Steamship or Railroad.

THE ROCK SPRING.—Workmen are engaged in altering the steps leading down to the "Rock Spring," turning them towards the West in order that the sand washing down from the hill above may not fill the spring. The Rock Spring is a time-honored landmark in Wilmington, and we should dislike to see it go to ruin. The water is not very palatable, but there is an ancient tradition that whoever drinks it soon, sooner or later, return to Wilmington. So let it be kept up by all means.

MANIFESTOS.—The new forms of Manifests, to accompany Drawback forms for foreign export, are now ready and for sale at the STAR office. These forms are indispensable to those making foreign shipments, the old forms not being recognized at the Custom House.

DETAINED.—We are informed that the Steamships Fairbanks and Rebecca Clyde were still at anchor yesterday inside the bar, being unable to proceed to sea in consequence of heavy tugs.

A SAD SEQUEL.—A city paper recently contained a pretty story of an industrious, honest man who, with "untiring and persevering exertions," cut six cords of wood, floated it down the river, sold it for a handsome price, and went on his way rejoicing; to cheer the hearts of his dependent family. Here we lost sight of him; but accident has thrown in our way the sequel of his story.

Strolling into a neighboring store, he invests his money in various domestic comforts, which the kind merchant encloses in an empty cheese box. He betinks him there is nothing more the good-wife wants, and not one child has been forgotten; and then, ah! fatal step—he takes a drink. Let us drop the mantle of charity over the scenes that followed. Suffice it that when next discovered he has lain his aching head and faltering limbs under the shelter of a steamship shed, and, cheese box by his side, is calmly sleeping. Awakening from his slumbers, he betinks him of his home, and seizing a neighboring cheese box, he staggers on his way. But a watchful eye has seen him, and a heavy hand is laid upon that poor man's shoulder, by a bold Knight of the Star. The cheese-box is uncovered, when, lo! what do we see? Not sundry little bundles, but a veritable cheese. What use his protestations? What need for further proof? Before good Justice Conoley is dragged this luckless youth. With tears slow trickling down his sadly sunken cheeks, he tells his plaintive story, and swears 'tis but the truth. Convinced that he has been more unfortunate than erring, the good Judge dismisses him with costs, and the poor fellow wends his way towards Bladen, minus his wood, his money and his self-esteem. Let us hope the lesson may not be lost upon him, and that his next honest effort may be crowned with better luck.

The Rambler, not a second edition of Dr. Johnson, by the way, has rumbled along up the wharf kicking up old musty by-gones, and the sound of his steps grows fainter and fainter. Anxiously, patiently, aye, tremblingly, have we waited for him in our sanctum, prepared with all our documents, historical and critical, to give him all the points. But, cruel, cruel fate! CAPTURE OF AN ESCAPED CONVICT.—Constables Sellers and Hewlett having been put upon the track of Joe Barnes and Patrick Artis, whose escape from the work-house is reported elsewhere, succeeded in coming up with Barnes yesterday morning. The culprit took to his heels and the officers gave hot chase. The race was even for some time; when both parties were almost exhausted, a reinforcement opportunely appeared in the shape of Sheriff Bunting on horse-back, who immediately charged en masse and literally rode down the enemy. Barnes was then secured and put in safe-keeping. Artis was still at large up to our latest intelligence, but our vigilant and efficient constables will doubtless capture him ere long.

The flags on the shipping in port were at half-mast yesterday in respect to the memory of Jonas Smith, Esq. of New York, who died recently at the advanced age of three score years and ten. Mr. Smith was a large ship owner, and was engaged extensively for many years in the coasting trade. We believe one of his earliest ventures was the establishment of a line of schooners between this place and New York, which was soon followed by other lines to Newbern and Charleston, and the "Jonas Smith" packets soon became great favorites with the shipping public, their popularity being undiminished up to the close of the war. We suppose Mr. Smith must have left a large fortune. He has at any rate left what is better than gold, a good name in the commercial world.

ESCAPE FROM THE WORK-HOUSE.—On Thursday last, Joe Barnes, (col.) confined in the county work-house for larceny, under sentence of two years imprisonment, and Patrick Artis, confined for the same offence one year, succeeded in making their escape from their keepers. The stockade being incomplete, extra vigilance is required to prevent the escape of the prisoners, and a guard is constantly kept over them, but it seems that an accident intervened to aid the rascals. After cutting with an axe the chains which attached balls to their ankles, they made a rush through the gate. The guard attempted to shoot them, but his weapon missed fire, and the villains made good their escape.

We are informed that a rise of two feet in the river has gladdened the hearts of the steamboatmen and added largely to their downward freight.

ROBBERY.—On Thursday night, the carriage-house of Dr. W. G. Thomas was broken open and a fine set of double carriage harness taken therefrom. It has since been discovered that the thieves were the two culprits who escaped from the work-house of that day. In addition to the harness, a celebrated black game rooster, belonging to a sporting gentleman of this city, was carried off by the same parties. Of-ficer Sellers was put on the track of the thieves and succeeded yesterday in recovering the harness, but it is feared the game rooster has died an inglorious death, and gone the way of all chicken flesh.

Wiley Jones, formerly Sheriff of Buncombe county, died recently in Cook county, Texas.

Arnold B. Williams, of Goldsboro', a colored man, was ordained as a minister of the Baptist Church on the 19th inst.

The Rev. Dr. Williams, of Greenville, S. C., has been called to the pastorate of the Baptist Church in Raleigh, which Dr. Skinner recently resigned.

The Executive Mansion in Raleigh is being thoroughly repaired and fenced. A much needed improvement.

The Wadesboro', *Argus* has received a potato which weighed over four and a half pounds, the plantings of which were procured in Wilmington last spring.

Phillip Smith and his two daughters, late of Anson county, have fallen victims to the yellow fever in Texas.

The Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, received new and very substantial hacks last week and put them on the line between Wadesboro' and Sand Hill Depot, the present Western terminus of the Eastern division.

Elder G. W. Griffin, of Madison, N. C., has accepted a call to the Baptist church in Lebanon, Tennessee.

Dr. Hart, of Newbern, who is connected with the Hospital of the Freedmen's Bureau, has received intelligence of the death of a near relative, who bequeathed him \$25,000.

C. S. Moring, of Rowan, a candidate for the Convention, has withdrawn his name from the canvass.

The Democratic gain in Ohio is officially shown to be 30,787.

A public meeting of those sympathizing with Garibaldi will be held at the Cooper Institute, New York, on Saturday evening.

Hon. Thomas A. Hendricks, at present in the United States Senate, is to be the Democratic candidate for Governor of Indiana.
