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

#### The Fight at Trivoli. FLORENCE, Nov. 6.

On Sunday Garibaldi with 3,500 men and two cannon left his camp, near Monte Rotondo, and advanced to attack Tivoli, which was held by Papal troops. He found the latter, numbering 6,000, posted in a strong position and supported by ar-tillery. The Pontifical troops immediate-ly opened fire with their batteries upon the approaching Garibaldians, and a desperate conflict ensued, which lasted fortyfive minutes, when Garibaldi retreated .-The battle was renewed at Monte Rotondo. The insurgents fought with great obstinacy and kept up the conflict at this point for two hours and a half, when, exhausted and overwhelmed, they gave way and were utterly routed.
