Interesting Relic-The Daguerreotype of a Lady Found on a Dead Soldier

at Gettysburg. The daguerreotype of a lady was found a week or two ago on the Gettysburg battle-field. Although somewhat discolored, it is in a remarkable state of preservation, and shows the features, dress, ornaments &c., very distinctly. It is on a plate, without a case, and was found in a cartridgebox, with forty-three bullets. The picture is that of a lady probably twenty or twenty-five years of age, dark hair, combed back and falling loosely over her shoulders; a light dress, apparently of thin and fancy texture, cut low at the neck, with wide sleeves, showing the larm to the elbow; gold ear drops, large breast-pin, two gold rings, one on first finger and the other on the third finger of the right hand; dark bead necklace, encircling the neck three times; and a guard chain of dark material passing from neck to waist, with,

probably, watch or miniature attached. The daguerrotype was found in a field in front of the Union lines between the Emmittsburg road and left of the position held by the Second Corps, on ground over which passed Pickett's Div., in its famous charge. A number of Confederate dead were buried in this field. The attention of the party finding the picture was attracted to a blanket, part of which was exposed by the washing away of the ground, and upon lifting the blanket the remains of a soldier were found with cartringesoon, ever There was nothing to indicate the corps, division, regiment or name.
