Reported Discovery of a Polar Continent in the Arctic Ocean.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6. The Honolulu Advertiser publishes an account of the discovery of land, hitherto unknown, in the Arctic Ocean, by Captain Long, of the whaleship Nile.

The past season has been the mildest that has been experienced by the oldest whalers, and Capt. L. was able to reach latitude 73:30.—He examined the land attentively along entire Southern coast, which he sketched. It seems to be quite elevated, and has a mountain near the centre, about latitude 180, resembling an extinct volcano, and estimated to be about 3,000 feet high.

Captain Long named the country Urongell's Land, after a Russian Emperor. The western point of the coast, in latitude 70 degrees 46 minutes north, longitude 78 degrees 30 minutes east, he named Cape Thomas, after the seaman who discovered it.

The Nile sailed several days along the coast, and approached within fifteen miles of the shore. The lower part of the land was free from snow, and appeared to be covered with vegetation. It was impossible to tell how far the land extended northward. Ranges of mountains could be seen until they were lost in the distance.

Fire at the Malby House.

The alarm of fire yesterday evening, about five o'clock, was caused by the burning of the rear portion of the Malby House. The fire, it appears, originated in the lower portion of the back premises, where the gas for the house is manufactured, and above which are the sleeping apartments of the servants of the hotel.

The flames reached the upper portion with great rapidity, and several of the employees escaped narrowly with their lives. Hugh McLeague, aged about forty years, employed as "yardman" at the hotel, who was asleep in one of the upper rooms at the time, was terribly burned about the head, arms, side and feet.

After an hour or more of well-directed efforts by the fire department, the fire was got under subjection.—Balt. Sun, 9th.

Shocking Kerosene Accident.

On Thursday forenoon the wife of William H. Miller, residing in Chestnut street, near Evergreen avenue, E. D., while trimming her kerosene lamps, accidentally let one of them fall on a red-hot stove, when the fluid immediately took fire and enveloped her in a sheet of flame.

In that condition, Mrs. Miller took her infant from its cradle, and then ran into the street. Arriving there, her agony became so great that she dropped her babe and ran a short distance, screaming for help. Two gentlemen immediately ran to her rescue, and by wrapping an overcoat and a horse-blanket around her person, succeeded in extinguishing her burning clothing.

They then removed her to her residence and summoned surgical aid, when it was found that her injuries must prove fatal. The unfortunate lady lived in great agony until yesterday, when death relieved her. The babe is so severely burned that its recovery is considered doubtful.—N. Y. World.

WHY IMPEACHMENT FAILED.

A correspondent of the Tribune says: "Not less than 46 members of the House had given notice to the Speaker of their intention to deliver speeches upon impeachment. The knowledge of this alarming fact was one reason why the anti-impeachment men refused to allow debate. But a deeper reason than this was the fear that the debate would become so warm and fierce that it might lead to a serious breach in the Republican ranks."

THE FLORIDA CONVENTION.

It is stated that Florida has voted for a Convention by about 1,500 majority. Of 45 delegates chosen, 27 are white and 18 colored.

Not Guilty.

Regarding the trial of Moses A. Bencint, in the Salisbury, N. C., Superior Court, charged with the murder of John Rich, in September last, the Old North State says:

The prisoner had an only sister, to whom he was devotedly and tenderly attached, and being suddenly informed that she had been seduced by Rich, and that he (Rich) had taken advantage of her presence in his own house to accomplish his designs upon her, he immediately, in a state of mental excitement, amounting almost to frenzy, rushed to the house of the deceased three and a half miles distant, and shot him, inflicting wounds of which he soon after died.

He then returned to the city and surrendered himself to a magistrate, remarking to him, "I have killed John Rich." He seduced my sister, whom I loved better than my own soul, and for whom I was willing to die. The killing was admitted, and the plea principally relied upon by the defence, was that, at the moment of the commission of the deed, his reason was so far dethroned by the shock occasioned by the sudden announcement to him of his sister's disgrace, as to render him irresponsible for the act, and it was upon this ground, doubtless, that the jury, after deliberating for twenty-four hours, returned a verdict of "not guilty."

Singular Occurrence.

A few days since a young lady in Gloucester, Mass., felt a disagreeable sensation near the right shoulder. In a few days a long black mark was visible, and shortly after a hard substance could be distinctly felt. Her physician was called, and succeeded in removing part of a hair pin. The supposition is that the young lady must have swallowed it when a child, though she has no recollection of so doing, and it has been working around the system ever since, until it finally came near the surface, and was safely removed.

Vitality of Oysters.

It may interest lovers of oysters to know that the oyster is very tenacious of life, and is said to keep up its organization at the human stomach for a long time. An oyster's heart, it is said, beats perceptibly half an hour after it is swallowed, all of which it is very pleasant to know.

The Village of Brock in Holland.

It is said to be the cleanest in the world. No horse or carriage has ever been permitted to enter, and everything is kept with the most scrupulous neatness. Before entering many of the houses you are required to remove your shoes. It is said that even the Emperor of Russia was compelled to comply with this custom.

DESTRUCTION OF LIFE IN CITIES.

During the year 1866 no less than 205 persons were killed by wheeled vehicles in the streets of London. This represents the deaths only; the number of accidents were of course much greater.

HEALTH OF NEW ORLEANS.

On the 4th inst. there were 32 deaths in New Orleans, including 8 from cholera and two from yellow fever.
