THE OLDEST MAN IN TOWN,-It always a matter of interest in every community to know who is "the oldest triarch, bending beneath the weight of many years, who can count upon his fingers so many generations that have passed before him, and, looking back through the dim vista of the past, behold, in his mind's eye, the forms of those whose names have passed into history, and tell of deeds, the memory of which makes the young blood of his listeners flow with fuller pulsations through their more vigorous veins, and urges them to make the future what the past has been. No matter who or what he is, how humble nor how poor, an old man is always an interesting study, a link in the chain that binds us to by-gones. We look at him with reverence, and listen to his words as we do to the faint echoes that come to our ears as we wander through the deserted halls of some ancient ruin.

We think the oldest man in Wilming-

ton is, unquestionably, old Uncle Moses Davis, whose stalwart form, and honest, black contenance, has been so long familiar among his piles of wood, in the traffic of which he earned his living. He was born about the time of the declaration of Independence in 1776, the precise year he does not know, and is now something over ninety years of age. He remembers the latter days of the revolution, and recalls distinctly the scene when Washington passed through the town, drawn by six black horses, with maidens strewing flowers in his path. Wilmington was then a mere village, a little settlement on the river-bank, with rank forests growing where now stand piles of masonry. Uncle Moses was the slave of Mr. George Moore, one of the earliest Cape Fear planters, and passed from his hands into the family of his son-in-law, Mr. Davis. To them we need not tell how Dionysius, tyrant of Syracuse, condemned to death Damon, a noble patriot Senator, who inspired his hatred by an unflinching opposition to his iniquitous proceedings, and an undaunted defiance when threatened with the weight done, in order that you may form a fair of the tyrant's bloody hand.

Thrown into prison and condemned to die, Damon's only vain regret is that he cannot bid farewell to his beloved Calantha and their only child, when Pythias, his friend and more than brother, offers his hands for the manacles and his head for a ransom, that the man whose soul was knit to his might be free to bid a last farewell to all he loved on earth. Accepting of this generous offer as freely as 'twas made, Damon hastens to his home. Ca lantha, blinded to honor by her love for him, beseeches him to flee from Sicily, but her tears and prayers cannot shake her husband's friendshp and his plighted faith, and her efforts fail in what Lucullus' treachery vell nigh accomplishes. That servant, who loves his master's person better than his honor, slays the steed that is to carry Damon back to Syracuse, and the head of Pythias seems doomed to fall. Frantic with grief, the injured master seeks revenge upon his too loving slave. At Syacuse the hour of death draws nigh, and Pythias is led out to the scaffold, almost lispairing, but never doubting his friend's faith. A few more minutes, and the axe will fall, when, far in the distance is seen a cloud of dust. Nearer and nearer it approaches; now shouts are heard, faint at first but growing louder; and, at last, breathless and bloody, sinking with horrid doubts, yet strong through Hope, Damon rushes foward aud falls at the scaffold's feet. Pythias is saved, his friend is there to meet the doom that had been well nigh his.


