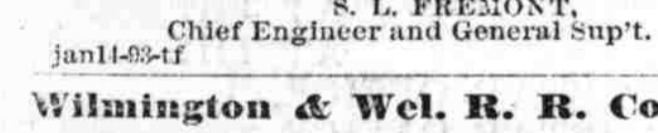

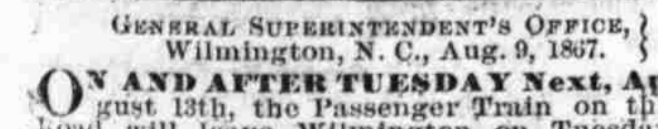

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GORILLA CONVENTION! Called by Act of the Congress of the Northern States to Frame a Radical Constitution for the State of North Carolina.

[FIFTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.] SATURDAY, JAN. 13, 1868. Convention came to order at 11 o'clock.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Smith of the city. Messrs. Legg, of Brunswick, and Dickey, of Cherokee, appeared, qualified and took their seats.

Mr. Heaton, from the Committee of Sixteen, to whom was referred the resolution of Mr. Pool, of Pasquotank, upon the subject of legislation by the Convention, offered the following report:

The Committee of Sixteen to whom was referred the resolution of Mr. Pool, of Pasquotank, have had the same under consideration, and report the following as a substitute therefor:

Resolved, That the Convention, being called to frame a Constitution and civil government, in accordance with the Acts of Congress, will proceed in the discharge of that duty as speedily as practicable.

Mr. Tourgee moved its adoption; and it was carried. Mr. Grant, of Wayne, moved that the Convention go into an election of an Engraving Clerk, and nominated J. E. O'Hara (negro), for the position.

Mr. Heaton, of Craven, moved to elect by acclamation. Mr. Sweet called attention to Rule No. 16, as applicable to such cases.

After quite a lengthy debate upon the proper construction of the Rule, it was determined to let the matter drop until resolutions regularly came up.

Mr. Bradley offered the following resolution, which lies over under the rule: Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor of North Carolina, and inform him of the organization of the Convention, and that the Convention is now ready to receive any communication he may desire to make.

The resolution offered by Mr. Ashley, on yesterday, coming up, he offered the following substitute: Resolved, That the Committee of Sixteen be instructed to further consider, and report, as soon as practicable, upon the best method of carrying into effect the Constitution establishing a civil government in North Carolina.

Mr. Abbott moved its adoption. Mr. Durhan's resolutions of yesterday (published in the Star of yesterday), were next reached, when Mr. Durhan said that, in order to give the other gentlemen time to consider the resolutions, he moved that they be made the special order for Wednesday next, at 12 o'clock.

Mr. King opposed the motion, and moved to lay them on the table. Mr. Durhan called for the yeas and nays.

Mr. Abbott said, that as he wished to discuss the resolutions, he would oppose the motion to table. J. H. Harris, of Wake, (negro), hoped that the gentleman from Lenoir (Mr. King) would withdraw the motion, as he wished to introduce a substitute.

Mr. King at once withdrew. (Harris thereupon introduced a substitute, which was so irrelevant as to be ruled out of order, and it was returned to him.) Mr. Ashley moved to refer the resolutions to a select Committee of three; but Mr. King renewed his motion to table.

Mr. McCubbins said that the reason why a postponement was wished, was that the resolutions might be withdrawn. Mr. Durham said that he did not intend to withdraw them under any circumstances.

Mr. Ellis wished their postponement, as he desired time for consideration. O'Hara was then selected, as a matter of course, but Messrs. Ellis, and McDonald, of Chatam, wished it understood that they voted for Ashley.

The Convention, upon motion of Mr. Ellis, adjourned until Monday morning.

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
