A Tennessee Mystery--Three Disguised Men Kidnap and Murder a Physician. The Nashville Banner, of June 4th, has the following account of latest phase of ruffianism in Tennessee:

"One of the most startling occurrences which has for some time come to our knowledge was the spirited away last Monday night of Dr. McAdams, formerly of Lewisburg, but recently residing at Chapel Hill, Marshall county. On the evening of last Monday a young man named Dr. McAdams, with seven others, members of an amateur string band, met at Miller's store, Chapel Hill, for the purpose of practice. The door of the store being closed, the young men prepared for their evening's entertainment. But soon after they had tuned their instruments there came a knock at the door. Dr. McAdams kept playing a banjo while a companion opened the door. A man dressed in red and white-spotted clothing, and wearing a mask, made his appearance, followed by another, who carried a long rope, and by a third holding his hands at his side, while three others remained outside the door. The first, without uttering a sound, took hold of Dr. McAdams' arm and quietly pulled him off the counter, while another of the band threw him violently to the floor. His hands and feet were then tied with the rope. At this unlooked-for outrage upon his person and liberty Dr. McAdams said: 'I know you, every one of you; but I want to die like a soldier.'

"The leader, endeavoring to disguise his voice, responded: 'We will show you how to treat traitors.'

"Dr. McAdams was then taken out of the house, to the great consternation of his companions. So completely was he taken by surprise that not one of them offered to render any assistance. After the three villains who were inside had conveyed their burden in the yard, they were joined by the other three, and went down the road toward Duck river. They had not proceeded a great distance before they met Mr. John Robertson, who was riding a horse. In a disguised voice one of the band remarked to Mr. Robertson, calling the latter by name, 'We want your horse.' What do you want with it? Mr. Robertson asked. 'We want your horse to put this man on. You will find him in the morning three and a half miles distant from here near the Long String bridge.'

"Mr. Robertson: 'Gentlemen, I don't know you, and I would not willingly lend my horse to persons who are entire strangers to me. You outnumber me, and if you will take my horse I cannot help it; you cannot have him with my consent.'

"The unknown horsemen then compelled Mr. Robertson to dismount, took his animal, and put Dr. McAdams upon it, and hastened away in the direction of Long String bridge, over Duck river, on the Nolensville pike. After the meeting with Mr. Robertson, nothing more was heard of the party that night. About daylight on Tuesday many citizens, who had already heard of the outrage, started out in the hope of finding McAdams. Near the centre of the bridge was found heaped up a quantity of hair, identified as having belonged to Dr. McAdams. It had the appearance of having been shaved from his head.

"The search proved vain. It is supposed that, after suffering many indignities from his tormentors, he was thrown into the river and drowned. The citizens living near by strongly believe that this was the case, and determined to drag the
