It is now settled that the Border Agricultural Society will hold another Fair some time in the month of October or November, though the precise time has not yet been definitely fixed. The Executive Committee have recently held a meeting, when the subject was under consideration, and it was unanimously agreed that the prospects for a Fair this Fall are more enconraging than they were last summer, when the exhibition of November last was in contemplation, and it is acknowledged far and wide that that exhibition was a complete and triumphant success.

The Richmond and Danville and the Piedmont Railroad companies, we understand, will make a liberal arrangement for the transportation of members of the Society and articles for exhibition.

It is thought that the State So-

ciety will have no Fair at Richmond this Fall; if so, there will probably be none nearer to us than the one at Staunton, which will increase rather than detract from the interest of the Fair here, since exhibitors may remove their articles from the one place to the other at trifling cost. We hope the Central Railroad Company will make as liberal arrangements as the Danville company do.

The thing will be properly warmed up after awhile, and all interested may rest assured that the fullest preparations will be made for a magnificent show. In the meantime the stock and poultry raisers; tobacco growers and other agriculturists; mechanics and all who think of bringing articles to the, Fair should begin to look ferward and make preparation accordingly. We presume the list of premiums will be large and liberal.
