28th, in this place, a negro man, known as Pegleg Ritchard. For some mouths past he had been suspected of theft. On the above date, a search warrant was sued out by Mr. Saddler, who had good reason for believing, that a lot of his tools were in Dick's possession(he was a harness maker) and placed in the hands of officer Neill for execu tion. The officer preformed his duty, and found the tools. While there, he recognized some goods which he thought had once been in the posession of Messrs, South & Cockrum; he informed Mr. Smith, who immediately sued out a search warrant, placing it in Neill's hands. In the

mean time Dick had left his store and went off to a bruther freedman and borrowed a double-barreled shot gun and returned. On the approach of Neill this time, Dick appeared, gun in hand cursing the officer, telling him it he darkened the door he would kill him. Neill appeared in the door and demanded a surrender, when Dick leveled his gun, already cocked, upon him. Neill stepped aside, and drew out his revolver, when Deputy Sheriff Gordon came up and called to Dick not to make a fool of himself but to surrender. Dick leveled his gun upon him and with an oath threatened to kill him if he entered the door. Gordon now stepped aside for the purpose of passing to the back of the house, when Neill remarked, Gordon, what must I do," and was answered "kill him if you can." Neill then fired, but missed him, and again called to him to surrender, but Dick still refused to do so.
