The Havana Lottery.

Most of our readers who have been in Havana, and many who have not, know something of the Havana Lottery, but a brief description of the *matras operandi*, as furnished by a correspondent of the "JOURNAL OF COMMERCE," may not be amiss:
It is an old institution from which the government has long derived a considerable revenue. At present the drawings are held every seven days, and the scheme is as follows: For each drawing there are issued by the government 26,000 tickets at \$20 each, amounting in the aggregate to \$520,000, of which sum 75 per cent. is distributed in prizes. The tickets are printed in fractions, having on them the consecutive numbers from 1 to 26,000. The prizes are—1 of \$100,000, 1 of \$50,000, 1 of 20,000, 1 of 10,000, 2 of \$5,000, 24 of \$1,000, 58 of \$500, 102 of \$400, and 225 of \$250. There are, besides, approximation prizes as follows: The 99 remaining numbers of the hundred in which the highest prize faces are each entitled to \$200 (for example, if number 12,564 gains the \$100,000, the numbers from 12,501 to 12,600 each gain \$200); in the same manner there are 99 approximation prizes of \$150 to the one of \$50,000, and 99 of \$100 to the \$20,000; and 27 approximations of \$200 each to the remaining numbers of the tens in which the prize of \$10,000 and the two of \$5,000 fall. These make in all 739 prizes, amounting to \$390,000. The tickets are bought by the *billetes* or street vendors from the office at \$20 and retailed at \$21.25. A considerable number of men and women, probably two or three hundred, thus gain a living in this city, where they are to be seen in all the principal thoroughfares, cafes and other places of resort, as also in all the cities of the island. The day before the drawing they are especially importunate in their solicitations, flourishing their tickets, and shouting lustily, *La juega manana!* (played to-morrow.) The drawings are held publicly, and are superintended by several officers of the government. In a large globe are placed 26,000 bits of ivory of the size of a dime, having on them the consecutive numbers from 1 to 26,000. In a smaller globe are placed similar bits of ivory having on them the various prizes from \$100,000 down. After the globes have been revolved and the bits of ivory well shaken, two small boys perform the drawing. One boy inserts his hand into the large globe and takes out a number which he exhibits to the inspectors and then calls out. At the same time the other boy draws from the other globe a prize which he also exhibits to the inspectors, and calls out. A man who stands in readiness writes on a black board, placed in view of the spectators, each number and prize as they are called. And so the drawing is continued until all the prizes are drawn from the smaller globe. To a physiognomist it affords no little amusement to watch the crowd of eager expectants, as the boys themselves so mechanically and indifferently draw and call out numbers and prizes in their shrill tones. *Tres mil doscientos viente y cinco!* pipes one; *Cuatrocientos pesos!* responds the other; and instantly on the black-board is written No. 3,223—\$400—and so on to the end.
