2. The second question submitted by the argument is whether the plaintiff's ac-tion was so barred, and we think the gen-eral principle insisted on by Mr. London for the defendants is correct. That the statute begins to run from the moment the right of action accrues, and unless the statute be totally repealed continues to run, although interrupted by temporary suspensions over all the ground and inter-vals not occupied by such suspensions. S. It is true that at the time of making 3. It is true that at the time of making the contract there was a statute—that of the 11th of May, 1861—which prohibited suits upon the particular class of choses to which this bill of acceptance belongs, and as to them it was provided that the time during which the laws should be in force shall not be computed, but this act was not in force on the 5th Sept., 1861, when the acceptance fell due, having been ex-pressly repealed by an which took effect in the previous August. The act of the 11th September follow-ing took effect " only from its ratifica-tion." Here, then, there were six days when under the State law, the Statute of Limitations operated upon this accept-

Limitations operated upon this accept-ance; but this act and the subsequent law of the 10th February, 1863, the statute re-lied on by the defendants as an excuse for their delay, operated over the whole pe-riod thence intervening until " the end of the war.

We hold that " the war" " ended " the 20th August, 1866, when peace was proclaimed by the President. There the statutory bar re-attached, expiring on the 20th August, 1869. The act of February, 1863 was recognized by our Supreme Court as of force at January Term 1867. Neely vs. Craig, 1 Phil., 187. It may be remarked in support of this view of the rights of the parties, that it is said in Co. Litt., Entries, that a descent cast in time of war will not toll the entry of bim who bath the right of entry, because, saith the book, where the Courts are not open for the administration of justice, whether occasioned by rebellion, insurrection or foreign invasion, it is said to be time of war, and laches is not then imputable to the party. 1 Hay. 250.
