**The Inspector Bill.**  
The following is the substance of the bill in regard to the Inspectors of this city as recently passed by the Legislature:  
1. It provides for the appointment of five Inspectors in the place of three.  
2. It gives the County Commissioners power to regulate the fees for rates of inspection, and limits the fee at three cents per lb.  
3. It reduces the bond from five thousand to three thousand dollars for Inspectors.  
4. It imposes a fine of two hundred dollars for any person to sell without inspection.
