THE COUNTY TAX BILL.—ADDITION.—A portion of the County Tax Bill has been published, and we now present to our readers the addition made to it by the County Commissioners at yesterday's session.

Every manufacturer of tobacco shall pay 2 1/2 per cent. on his purchases of leaf tobacco. Every person who for himself, or as agent for another, sells riding vehicles shall pay 2 per cent. on sales.

Every auctioneer on all goods, wares, and merchandise, sold by himself or Agent, whether or not the growth or manufacture of this State shall pay 1 per cent. on gross amount of sales, subject to the exemptions and regulations set forth in the tenth chapter, Revised Code, entitled "Auctions and Auctioneers."

Every itinerant who deals in or puts up lightning rods shall pay \$10. Every Company of gypsies or strolling companies of persons earning a support by pretending to tell fortunes, horse trading, tinkering, or begging shall pay \$100.

Every Insurance Company, incorporated by this State, shall pay 10 per cent. on dividends or profits, payable in April and October.

Every Insurance Company, not incorporated by this State, shall pay an amount of assessments collected, premiums received, and obligations for premiums, 1 per cent. Every Express Company shall pay 3 per cent. on its gross receipts, payable every three months.

Every Public Ferry shall pay 1 per cent. on gross receipts of such ferry. CONVENTION.—The officers of the various Railroad Companies constituting the Atlantic Coast Line, yesterday held a Convention in the Purcell House of this city, in response to a call from Hon. R. R. Bridges, President of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad Company.

Samuel Davis was appointed Assessor for Cape Fear Township vice J. W. Johnson relieved. Resolved, That the Board meet on Thursday, the 27th inst., to examine the sufficiency of the bond of the Sheriff of this County, in accordance with the provisions of the act entitled "An Act Requiring Sheriffs to Give Sufficient Bonds," and ratified 12th April, 1869.

The County Tax Bill received additions that we publish in another column. Adjourned to meet again Thursday, 27th inst.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, SECTION 1.—That between Campbell and Castle Streets, at River and Sixth Streets, no excavation shall be used as a privy vault, and every owner or occupant of any lot within the said boundaries shall cause to be constructed a good and substantial box or boxes to be placed under each privy or privies for the deposit of filth, and so arranged that they can be withdrawn at any time.

SECTION 2.—That on or before the 15th day of each month, the Marshal shall cause all such privy receptacles to be examined, and if found to be empty and the filth therein removed to a distance at least one mile from the city.

SECTION 3.—That the owner, or in the absence of the owner the occupant, of each such privy for every privy box emptied the sum of thirty-five cents per month, and the Marshal is hereby authorized to collect the same at the end of each month.

SECTION 4.—Any violation of the above sections of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine not less than five dollars nor more than twenty dollars.

SECTION 5.—This ordinance shall take effect from and after the first day of June, 1869.

SECTION 7.—The Marshal is hereby instructed with the thorough enforcement of this ordinance, and the execution thereof shall be done at his own expense to the city. my 19-31-69
