SECTION 1—That between Campbell and Castle Streets and River and Sixth Streets, no excavation shall be used as a privy vanit, and every owner or occupant of any lot within the said boundaries shall cause to be constructed a good and substantial box or boxes to be placed under each privy or priving for to be placed under each privy or privies for the deposit of flith, and so arranged that they can be withdrawn at any time.

SEC. 2—That on or before the 15th day of each month, the Marshal shall cause all such privy boxes within the limits as above described to be emptied and the filth therein removed to a distance at least one mile from

SEC. 3—That the owner, or in the absence of the owner the occupant, of each lot shall pay for every privy box emptied the sum of thirty-five cents per month, and the Marshal is hereby authorized to collect the same at the end of each month.

SEC. 4—Any violation of the above sections of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine not less than five dollars nor more than

SEC. 5-This ordinance shall not apply to privies emptying into sewers or running streams of water.

Sec. 6—This ordinance shall take effect from and after the first day of June, 1869. SEC. 7—The Marshal is hereby instructed with the thorough enforcement of this ordinance, and the execution thereof shall be done without any expense to the city.


