THE WORKING PROPLE. The stone masons of Orange, N. J., are

again on a strike, in consequence of a reduction of wages from \$4 50 to \$4 a day; They had struck some time age for an advance from \$4 to \$4 50 and were successful, but the employers now refuse to pay that rate. The Hotel Waiters' Union of New York have appointed a committee to ask the proprietors to raise their wages from \$30 to \$35 a month after June 1st. The waiters complain that they are obliged to work from 15, to 16 hours a day, and are put to great expense in providing their clothes. The clothing manufacturers on a small scale, in New York, have tormed themselves into twelve unions and are making preparations to demand an perease of 25 per cent, upon the present scale of prices. These small manufactur-ers make up the goods for the large readymade clothing warehouses, and employ in some instances as many as fifty female hands. The hack drivers of New York have made a demand upon the owners for an increase of wages from \$1.75 to \$8 a a week in order to perfect the organization of the drivers. At the Brooklen Navy Yard, about 1500 workmen are employed, who receive the following per diem rates of wages :- Masons \$4, painters \$2 80, blacksmiths \$2 80, gun-carriage makers \$2.80, plumbers \$2.80, hod carriers \$2, carpenters \$3 20, ship carpenters \$2 80, dock builders \$2 20, block makers \$2 80, laborers \$1 40a1 60. In Portland, Me,, it is stated that women are making clothing for New York houses at the following rates: Woollen sack coats 25 cents apiece, pantaloons 121 to 18 cents, ordinary overcoats 40 cents, and for the

RESULTS OF SPECULATION.

heaviest and best made 60 to 75 cents.

A grain speculator of Milwaukie has relarge sums of money by means of advances upon forged bills of lading of flour. Four years ago this person, it is stated, retired from the pork-packing business with \$125,000 clear gain, having been highly successful, his books showing that on one day his profits from sales amounted to \$80,000. He then went into wheat speculations, and in two years became utterly bankrupt, his assets being merely nominal, and his lisbilities amounting to over \$87,000. He next raised \$13,000 on property belonging to his wife, and became managing partner of an extensive mill turning out two thousand barrels of flour a week. In this position, he took advantage of his entire control of the funds to enter into outside speculations, and becoming involved entered upon a series of fraudulest transactions, such as drawing the money of the firm and obtaining advances upon drafts drawn against forged and altered bills of lading. This brief history carries with it a striking illustration of the dangers of rash speculation.

BREVET COMMISSIONS.—The United States Attorney General has recently decided that the Act of Congress of March 1st, 1869, which declares "that hereafter commissions by brevet shall only be conterred in time of war and for distinguished conduct in the presence of the enemy" does not exclude from brevet promotion officers who have conducted themselves meritoriously during hostilities against the Indians. 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
