We copy the annexed paragraph from a Northern paper:

A letter from one of the Liverpool steamship agencies received at New York Saturday morning, says an average of five thousand emigrants may be expected at the port of New York for the next five or six weeks to come.

The problem "What is to be done with the crowd when they come, unless they push out West?" is easily solved. And we are surprised that some of the Northern editors have not found the solution by turning their eyes Southward.

Excellent land may now be bought in North Carolina for five dollars (cash) per acre. Ordinarily, fifty acres is the maximum quantity that a foreigner would care to cultivate.

We offer inducements also to those emigrants, who, having no capital, are willing to work as farm laborers. It is too late now to make contracts for the present year, generally, but, even at this time, there are some planters who would be glad to employ skilled and reliable white labor at remunerative prices to the employer.

North Carolina needs more capital and more muscle. A man of capital can come here and his money will do him good. A man of muscle may come here and dig pecuniary independence out of our generous soil.

If New York is at a loss for territory and employment for emigrants, let her unfold to their minds the inducements we offer right here in this "Good Old North State."

THE LATE EXCURSION.

Departure of the Excursionists from Weldon-Courtesies on the part of the Managers-Arrival at Portsmouth-Visit to Fortress Monroe-Return and Reception at Norfolk-Entertainment at the Opera House-General Remarks, &c., &c.

(Correspondence of the Star.)

Dear Star:—It was my happy fortune to be numbered with the excursionists who visited Norfolk and the Capes on Wednesday.

The train, consisting of sixteen cars, after the party had been transferred from the train which brought them to Raleigh, left this place at 7 1/2 A. M. for Norfolk. Everything had been prepared for their accommodation by the gentlemanly manager of the Seaboard Road, Mr. Gbio, even the smallest service that would tend to augment their pleasure had not been overlooked.

Food and drinks of all kinds had been prepared and served to the appreciative crowd at intervals of half an hour. We traveled rapidly, and nothing that could in any manner mar our pleasure occurred.

It was sound and with one acclamation by this large body of persons of both sexes that on no part of their route had they been so well cared for as on the Seaboard Road and Steamers, which is all due to Mr. Gbio, Capt. Brennan, the conductor, and their well-tried assistants.

We soon reached the fort, where we were welcomed by the commander, Gen. Barry, who, in honor of our arrival, reviewed his troops, which made quite a grand display.

I would I could describe the grand scenery, both natural and artificial, that met our gaze at every step, but I have not the time and must confess that I am inadequate to the task.

We surveyed the Fort and its surroundings for three-quarters of an hour, when we went back on board and started on our return to Norfolk, where we arrived at 3 P. M., and were met by a vast concourse of people who conducted us to the Opera House, where everything was in readiness to receive the company.

I should here mention that one or two fire companies turned out to meet us, presenting quite a grand display. Arrived at the Opera House, Col. Lamb introduced Mayor Decordy who, in a few brief but appropriate remarks, welcomed us to their "city by the sea."

Col. Hinton was next introduced, and entertained the audience for a few minutes in a style that would elicit the commendation of every admirer of eloquence. Judge Osborne next spoke in tones that need no encomium at my hands.

In conclusion Col. Lamb made a few remarks, inviting the company to a collation prepared for them at the hall above the hall, and while away the night as each inclination prompted.

I left, on my return trip, this place next morning, with an ardent hope cherished as well as expressed that this might be the inception of a grand reunion between the Old North State and the Old Commonwealth.

Arriving at Weldon we learned that the ball which was to have been given the night of the 16th, was a grand success, and many fair girls graced the occasion. It was with a little regret that I left home, which was so soon to be the scene of gaiety, but motives which no one will question prompted me.

I purpose attending a grand picnic at Enfield to-day, and will mention it next time, provided anything occurs that I think would interest your readers.

I have only to regret that time and, as I feel, appropriate too small space will permit me from giving a more extended account. Suffice it to say that everything connected with the excursion and the ball at Weldon, of which I have an account for the benefit of my countrymen, is the chiming of evening bells.
