SENT TO THE WORK HOUSE.—James Dudley and Willis Harrisfield, the two colored pickpockets who have before been spoken of, were yesterday sent to the Work House agreeably to the mandate of the Special Court. Charles Strodes one of the Work House guards escorted the prisoners to their destination.

DON'T FANCY WORK.—We learn from the Superintendent of the Poor House that many of the paupers at that institution by no means fancy work, and rather prefer leaving to laboring. Since the season for work has commenced, many have run away, and the number is now reduced to forty-five, much less than it was a few weeks ago.

PHOTOGRAPH TAKEN.—Ire Grant, alias Ire White, the colored man of a "Sunday suit" fame, was yesterday carried to Mr. Yates' photographic gallery, and his unexpressive countenance was transmitted to paper. We hear that a number of prisoners have recently sat for photographs which are kept in the possession of the authorities.

ARRESTED ON CAPTAS.—Fred Kilg (white) was yesterday arrested on a capias, charging him with retailing liquor contrary to the law. Also, Lewis Levy (col.) was arrested in order to obtain from him a bond for his appearance at the next term of the Special Court to stand trial for assault and battery—an old offense. Both gave bonds, and were thereupon released.

HOT EGG ALABAMA.—About one hundred and sixty persons last evening departed for Montgomery, where they were going for contract with E. F. Martin, (colored), the Agent for the Montgomery and Eufaula Railroad. The laborers were of both colors, the black greatly predominating. They are to be fed and paid \$20 per month; it appears that Martin has not with a decided success in persuading his color to "immigrate," and we certainly wish him more than ordinary success in that line.

COWAY, COMMISSIONER.—The Board of County Commissioners will meet next Tuesday morning, and will remain in session one week; during which time complaints in regard to the assessment of real estate in the county will be heard from the tax-payers.

ARREST OF AN ESCAPED PRISONER.—Constable Sellars yesterday afternoon succeeded in arresting George Mason, a white man that escaped from Fayetteville jail, about two weeks ago. Mason is charged with having broken into the store of Col. Duncan Marchbanks, and Little River, Cumberland county; and was imprisoned on this accusation, and made his flight in company with Cato Potts, Lewis Higgs, and Edward—three colored worthies still at large.

Mason had enlisted with E. F. Martin as a hand on the Montgomery and Eufaula Railroad, and was prepared to start when Constable Sellars arrested him on the other side of the river, Martin, as before stated, is the General Agent for obtaining hands for this road.

It is thought that the remainder of the gang that escaped from the Fayetteville jail together with a number of the burglars that have infested this city for sometime are among the enlisted hands that intend starting for Alabama. Mason was yesterday placed in jail, and will there remain subject to the call of the Fayetteville authorities.

RIVER AND MARINE NEWS.

Weather the warmest day of the season. Business neither active nor very dull. No vessels have sailed from below since our last report, and it is unnecessary to again repeat the list based out. The Steamship Mary Sanford, which for several days has been in the rip at the Western Bar, is thin, leaky, and critical condition. A small portion of her cargo has been thrown overboard, part taken off by the sloop Fish, and the Alex. Oldham arrived at the city this afternoon (Saturday) having on board one hundred and sixty barrels of rum of which she relieved the Sanford. The Oldham returned with a steam pump. The Gov. Worth, also, steamed down the river for the purpose of rendering any assistance within her power.

The Sanford did not spring a leak till this (Saturday) morning. It is probable she will be saved, though she has sustained considerable injury. Steamship W. F. Clyde cleared for this port on the 17th instant.
