

GRAND EXCURSION.—A grand excursion to Waccamaw Lake will to-morrow be given under the auspices of Mr. Olivet Council No. 9, F. of T. and we acknowledge an invitation to form one of the party.

WATERMELONS.—We yesterday saw for sale in our market watermelons, grown on the plantation of Mr. John A. Odum, Wrightsville Sound. The largest melon brought \$1.50 each, and the smaller ones sold from fifty cents to \$1.00.

PRESENT TO THE MARSHAL.—The No 3 colored fire company has presented the Marshal with a beautiful gold badge, bearing on it the following engraving: "The Marshal of the City of Wilmington."

A NEGRO man employed by one of our Railroad Companies recently lost his sister, and not having means to pay her burial expenses, addressed a letter to the officers of the Company asking assistance, which they liberally and cheerfully granted from their private purses, thus showing how readily disposed our Southern whites are to aid the colored man when in distress; and, also, showing the necessity of the colored people organizing charitable societies for such purposes as the one to which we allude.

CHARLES SIMPSON.—This colored youth was yesterday arrested by Constables Sellers and Carr, and carried before Justice McQuigg to answer the charge of having stolen a watch from a colored man named Benjamin Robinson. It appeared the act was committed on the 26th ult, and on that day Simpson was arrested and carried before the Special Court, but the principal witness was absent, and the testimony thus lost so much of its weight, that the prisoner was deemed not guilty and was released.

AS A PARTY of colored persons were coming out of Pine Forest Cemetery on Sunday afternoon last, a coffin, containing the corpse of a child, was discovered lying upon the ground unburied. Upon inquiry, the keeper of the Cemetery stated the mother had brought it there, but was without the means to pay for digging the grave, and hence it was left in that exposed state. They very generously took up a subscription among themselves, and paid the necessary burial expenses.

ABOUT TO DROWN HER.—John Saunders, a colored barber, was yesterday arrested on the charge of having attempted to drown a "colored woman" by throwing on her several buckets of water. It appeared that she had occupied Saunders' door as a stand for retailing cakes and candy; and the barber was by no means anxious to have the passage to his shop barricaded by the bulky form of the cake seller. He informed her time and again to leave; and she persistently refused. Yesterday he tried the virtue of several buckets of water on the amazon's head. The effect was magical. She departed, but returned in a few minutes to see the arrest of the tonsorial gentleman, who was carried to the City Hall, and required to give a bond of \$50 for his future appearance before the Special Court, to be tried on the grave charge of attempting to "drown" a peaceable "colored woman."

WE hear that the delegates from the last named township were instructed to vote for the nomination of Larkins; and we further hear this aspiring youth is confident of gaining a complete victory over the C. P.

No Court.—We learn that the Special Court will hold no session on to-morrow. The Court will merely be called to order, and the preliminaries for a session on the next day be arranged.

COMMITTED TO JAIL.—Charles Simpson, a colored youth of precocious disposition and loose morals, was yesterday committed to jail in default of giving the bond required of him by Justice McQuigg, before whom he underwent a preliminary examination. Simpson was charged with larceny.

Called Meeting of the Board of Aldermen.—A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen was yesterday afternoon held; and we present the proceedings to our readers in a condensed form.

The "dog ordinance" was repealed, and another substituted in its stead. The new one is very similar to the old one with the exception of having the harmless curs muzzled. This clause is omitted, and wisely omitted.

The "barber ordinance" was changed so as to read "barbers shall be allowed to keep open their shops till ten o'clock A. M., on Sunday."

The Board of Assessors were received and tendered their books which were also received with the thanks of the Board for the arduous task the Assessors had performed.

It was resolved that the Mayor be instructed and authorized to make a note or notes, in the name of the City, for the amount of \$30,000, for twelve months, payable to such persons and in such manner as the Corporation Attorney and the Finance Committee may advise.

An ordinance was passed, empowering the Mayor to form a contract with Dr. J. E. Winants and H. E. Scott to care for the City sick and poor. The former to receive the sick at 40 cents per diem, and the latter to take charge of the poor at the rate of 30 cents each per day. The contract with the U. S. Government for the support of marines will be turned over to Dr. Winants. Mr. Scott, the Superintendent of the Poor House, must send his sick, furnishing himself the transportation, to the City Hospital. This ordinance dates from July 1st 1869, and the discontinuance of the City Physician's salary is to date from the same day. A Board of Supervisors, consisting of the Mayor, Marshal, and Alderman Howe (col.) was appointed to superintend the carrying out of this contract, and there will be presented at the next meeting an ordinance, defining the duties of the Board of Supervisors.

W. H. Moore (col.) was granted a recommendation for a license to retail liquors.

An ordinance was passed giving persons till 1st October next to remove obstructions from the streets.

Board adjourned till 26th inst.
