were of no avail. The Hook and Ladder Company did all that human power could do, but their manful exertions could not save the valuable property over which the flames were spreading, resisting all impediments, and rapidly increasing in space.

First the store of Mr. Matthews was burned to the ground, and then the outer buildings, including two or three warehouses, were destroyed. The flames continued to spread till they reached the large and valuable building, known as the "Clarendon Bank." Here the firemen did their utmost to extinguish the fire, but still the exertion met with no success, and the flames did not diminish until naught remained upon which to lick their fiery

This fire, like all large fires, was not without its attendant casualties. THE ELECTION .- The election has passed off, and for the next few days its result will be the theme of conversationespecially by those who were interested in the contest, Eagles has most probably been elected, and it now only remains to be seen by what majority.

Accepting the assertion, made by Eagles friends, that he has carried the county by hundreds of majority, then "Gee Zee," Arnold, Rourke, Mabson and Co., will for weeks be elated with the victory which their money, their energy, their "wire pulling," has gained; and Price, Larkins, Avant, Duncan Holmes and Co. will for months cherish gloomy thoughts over the failure of their cause-a cause in which they embarked without the incen tive of gain, without the hope of individ ual reward, and without the intention o " political monopoly," They assumed their position after deliberation, and they ad hered to it with a steadfastness that re flects credit on them as men, as voters, as "politicians."

They fought manfully, and, it detented have only lost the victory after a stubbor resistance that has no precedent in "recon structed" politics. They have managed the campaign as well as men without mon ey could conduct a contest, and their fail ure, if failure it prove, carries with it no reproach to their energy or enthusiasm but simply proclaims their misfortune in not being supplied with money-that es sential to the success of a campaign, to b conducted in the year 1869.

The Larkins faction were respectable i numbers, not deficient in brains, and no wanting in energy; but these advantages were nothing compared to the "wire working" of "Gee Zee", of Mabson, Arnold, Rourke, and others; and they sank into zero when compared to the pecuniary considerations which the "clique" offered to voters, and to the lavish hand with which "the ring" cast the large supply of greenbacks within its grasp.

The election of Eagles may dishearten a few of the Larkins party, but such an unfaltering determination and such an unchangeable sentiment, as that possessed by Price, Avant, Holmes and other leaders. can never be shaken by adversity, and will know no diminution as the political world revolves on the axis of '69, if we may so use the term.

The challenge has been issued and accepted by each of the contending factions and war has been declared, and waged at the ballot box; but peace has not been permanently restored, and the minority party will not cease in its determination to win the next election at all hazards.

The Conservatives had little real interest in the result, and we will not discuss the probable benefit or injury to accrue from Eagles' conceded election.

The contest was begun by the opposing factions of the Republican party; was fought principally by those two factions, and has resulted in the temporary overthrow of one, without dotting for the present the political horizon with dark spots or sunny gleams.
