DEATH OF DR. J. F. McREE.—Yesterday morning this aged and respected citizen breathed his last, and after three quarters of a century on this earth his cherished form was sacredly laid in the coffin, preparatory to its interment beneath the sod of his native land—a land he had loved so long and well. The subject of this short sketch was one whom eulogy cannot paint in all his nobility, nor can friendship enumerate his numerous virtues without continued sighs that one so loved should die.

Dr. J. Fergus McRee was for many years the ablest physician in this section, and his memory will long be cherished by an appreciative public, and over his grave science will mingle her tears with those of affection. The deceased leaves a posterity that will never cease to regard his name with a tender affection, and whose just pride will ever be to emulate his virtues. Wilmington will never forget him whose talents and nobleness added a lustre to her list of sons, and the relatives of the departed can have no prouder recollection than when they trace their lineage to Dr. J. Fergus McRee.

MEETING OF THE NEW HANOVER COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETY.—The members of this society held on yesterday a called meeting, the object of which is fully explained by the appended report furnished us for publication. The New Hanover County Medical Society, pursuant to notice, met in the office of the President at 4 o'clock P. M. Present, Dr. Anderson, Cutlers Potes, Wright, Robinson, Wood, and W. Bellamy. The following Physicians being present, were invited to participate in the transactions and deliberations of the Society: Dr. H. A. Beery, J. D. Bellamy, W. Davis and W. J. Love. The President arose and announced the death of an old member, and ex-President of this Society, Dr. James F. McRee, and stated that the object of this meeting was to prepare a series of resolutions commemorative of this sad event, and have the same recorded in the journal of this Society.

Upon motion a Committee of four consisting of Drs. W. A. Beery, F. J. Cutler, E. A. Anderson, and W. G. Thomas, was appointed to prepare the resolutions, and report at a meeting to be held on Thursday evening next. The following Preamble and Resolution were offered and adopted: WHEREAS we have with great regret heard of the death of an old member and ex-President of this Society, Dr. James F. McRee. Resolved, That the Members of the New Hanover County Medical Society and the members of the profession in the City who participated in the meeting, attend in a body the funeral of our deceased friend. The Society adjourned to meet again on Thursday at 8 o'clock P. M. W. G. THOMAS, M. D., President. WM. J. H. BELLAMY, M. D., Sec'y.

THE FULL OFFICIAL ELECTION RETURNS.—The County Commissioners yesterday met, and, after examining the official election returns from the different townships in the county, declared J. S. W. Eagles duly elected to a seat in the House of State Representatives by a majority of 509 votes. The following is the vote in full as returned by the poll holders:

Eagles' majority, 509. The Commissioners gave their sanction to these reports, and will meet again on the 19th inst. for the purpose of qualifying the newly elected. EXAMINATION OF GEORGE L. MABSON.—The particulars of Mabson's arrest on Saturday last were mentioned in Sunday's STAR; and it now remains to speak of his examination on yesterday. The charge was having voted twice in the recent election; and the attorneys employed were Messrs. Strange and Holmes for the prosecution; and the Messrs. Devane, associated with Messrs. Wright & Stedman, for the defense. The case was before Justice E. H. McQuigg. The number of witnesses examined were numerous, and we will condense the testimony of the principal ones, and merely allude to the evidence of the less important witnesses. D. A. Sadgwar (col.) testified as follows: That early in the morning H. Kuhl, challenger in the 1st Ward on the part of the Larkins party, went to breakfast, and left himself to fill his place. About 8 o'clock, or earlier, Mabson approached the polls and asked to vote. His name was found, and he handed his ticket to Robert Sweat who put it in the ballot box. Shortly afterwards Sadgwar was compelled to leave, and he summoned Robert H. Brown (col.) to assume his place till Kuhl's return. During Sadgwar's return to his breakfast he met Kuhl, informed him Mabson had voted, and coupled this information with the injunction that Mabson be ejected. Testimony of Robert H. Brown (sworn): Assumed Sadgwar's place between the hours of 7 and 9 o'clock, and in a few minutes Mabson voted, handing his ticket to Toney Ashe, col. who slipped it in the ballot box. He could not say whether or not the name was checked on the books, when the vote was made. H. Kuhl (sworn): Arrived at the polls shortly after sunrise, and departed before 8 o'clock, leaving Sadgwar in his place as challenger.

When returning from breakfast he met Sadgwar, who told him Mabson had voted, and that the Eagles men were very active electioneering. When witness reached the polls to reassume his position, he did not see Brown; and at once took his stand. Near 10 o'clock, Mabson reached the polls, and said "I wish to vote now." Kuhl asked Rourke if the applicant had not been voted, and to this interrogation R. replied in the negative, and turned to Mabson's name, checking it, as he gave his ballot to Sweat who placed it in the box. Kuhl called Sadgwar, who had, also, returned, and asked him if Mabson had not once before cast his ballot. Sadgwar answered in the affirmative, and turned to Mabson, saying, "Didn't you vote before?" The reply was "Yes." "Then," said the witness, "you have voted twice." "What is it to you? I will vote a dozen times if allowed."

Such is the evidence given by H. Kuhl. TESTIMONY FOR THE DEFENSE. G. M. Arnold, col. (sworn): Arrived at the polls twenty minutes past 7 o'clock, and immediately took cognizance of everything passing. Was there when Sadgwar entered, and swore that Mabson didn't vote, while Sadgwar was in the room, nor while Brown was present. Witness left the room only twice, the first time for the space of several minutes only, and during his second departure the polls were closed as a row was in progress in front of the Engine House. When he first left, a gentleman was waiting to vote, and when he returned the same party was just leaving the vicinity of the box; and hence, Mabson could not have voted while witness was away. Swore Mabson voted only once, and affirmed none but Sweat, Rourke and Penny put a ballot in the box during the day. G. P. Rourke, col. (sworn): Was at the polls on the opening of them, as he was a poll-holder. Didn't leave but once, and then for a few minutes. Checked Mabson's name when he voted, and had he put in another ballot two crosses would have been opposite, but there was one, and one only, to be seen on the books now. Sweat received the ticket. Rourke affirmed that Kuhl did not challenge Mabson's vote, and never spoke on the subject to witness. Robert Sweat, col. (sworn): Went to the polls soon after sunrise to hold the box. Mabson did not vote before 10 or 11 o'clock, and at that time handed the ticket to witness, who first saw his name checked before putting the ballot in the box. Didn't leave the room in the forenoon. Swore Mabson did not vote during Rourke's short absence, and affirmed neither Sadgwar nor Brown was present so far as he could see, when Mabson did vote, but remembered seeing Kuhl. Toney Ashe, col. (sworn): Was at the polls, in the capacity of a policeman, from 7 1/2 morning till close. Sadgwar not there when he first arrived. Could see every man who voted during the day. Mabson did not hand him his ticket, but voted through the proper person, Sweat, and witness cast his own vote in the same manner shortly afterward. Swore that Mabson challenged Sadgwar's vote on the ground of minority, and S. replied "I'll fix you, sir." First saw Sadgwar about 11 o'clock. Swore he saw Rourke check Mabson's name, when the latter voted.

OTHER WITNESSES. A number of other witnesses were examined but their testimony simply went to prove the good character of Sadgwar. All of the witnesses for the defense, and some of those for the prosecution, testified favorably as to the worthy character of Mabson. REMARKS. The witnesses generally bore themselves well, and all evinced a partisan feeling to a slight though not censurable extent. The prosecution's witnesses were Larkins men; those of the defense were Eagles men. SADGWAR. It was early proved that Sadgwar had shortly before the election threatened to come Mabson, if he "crooked his finger a t h i m," and it was conclusively shown that between the two, were no such sentiments as those felt by Damon for Pythias, and vice versa. Still Sadgwar's good character was proved by many witnesses, although the defense evidently doubted and openly impeached his testimony to the last. RECESS. After the evidence had been recited, the Court took a recess till 3 o'clock at which time the lawyers were present, prepared to deliver their SPEECHES. Mr. John L. Holmes made the opening speech for the prosecution. He was followed by Majors Stedman and Devane, both for the defense. Col. Strange on the part of the prosecution made the closing speech. Both sides were ably conducted, and the attorneys showed a thorough acquaintance with their duties, and displayed to advantage their forensic attainments. THE DECISION. Justice McQuigg decided that the prisoner at the bar should give a bond of \$500 for his appearance before the next term of the Superior Court, and unexcep-

tionable security was immediately offered and accepted. The dense mass of lookers-on, that had thronged the Court room, now departed, commenting on the unusual examination to which they had patiently listened for six hours or more.
