HARBOR MASTER'S FEES .- At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage, held on Tuesday last, Silas N. Martin Chairman, and B. G. Bates and James H. Chadbourn being present, a letter from the Chairman to N. Sargent, Commissioner of Customs, in relation to Harbor Masters' fees, and the answer to the same, were presented. We were furnished with the whole correspondence, but its length, and the lateness of the hour last evening when it came to hand, compels us to give only a brief syn-

The letter of Mr. Martin to the Commissioner refers to the late correspondence of that official with the Collectors of several cities of the United States regarding the collecting of Harbor Masters' fees, and to the refusal of many of our merchants and agents of vessels to pay the usual fee of three dollars; and then asks the question, if, under the decision quoted in the correspondence referred to, the State of North Carolina is powerless to enforce the collection of the said fees, and also, if it be illegal to collect the Harbor Masters' tee, if it is not equally so to collect pilotage. To which the Commissioner, in his reply, after referring to the decision quoted in the correspondence alluded to in the outset, declaring the collection of the said fee unconstitutional and illegal, says: "I know of no way, therefore, of enforcing, legally, their collection;" and declares, in answer to the second question, that the collection of pilotage, under the decision of the Courts, is not equally illegal. He also intimates that the harbor regulations are a matter of city police, and the expense should be borne by the

The Board then ordered that from and after the 20th inst., no pilots shall be alowed to run as regular pilots on any vessel except they ship as first mate, as required by Regulations No. 5, of the Rules and Regulations of this port, revised Sept. 18, 1868; and that when a full branch pilot conforms to the above regulations he shall be granted leave of absence for term not exceeding three months, at any one time, and that for such leave of absence he shall pay the clerk two dollars for the same, for the use of the Board

It was also ordered that when the master, agent or consignce of vessels arriving at this port shall voluntarily pay three dollars to the Harbor Master, they may command at all times his services while they remain in port, but if they refuse, then the fee is fixed at Five Dollars, for the first visit, and Two Dollars and Fifty Cents for each subsequent visit, which shall be collected as provided in Revised Code, Chapter 3, page 461.

THE CAPE FEAR ACADEMY .- An interesting incident of the approaching Fair will be the parade and drill at the Fair grounds of the cadets of this institution. Our country friends will have an opportunity of seeing the results of Gen. Colston's labors to establish in this city a first-class educational institution, worthy of the patronage of the whole State.

The Academy is already an established institution, and one which Wilmington regards with unspeakable pride. The high reputation earned by Gen. Colston in his fifteen years' experience as a Professor of the Virginia Military Institute has been amply vindicated by the brilliant success which has attended his labors here. Though hardly a year has clapsed since its establishment, Cape Fear Academy already presents an educational standard superior to that of many colleges. The boys whom General Colston is now training will in a few years vindicate the judicious discipline and admirable system of instruction, which he has already ma-

The Academy now embraces seventyfive cadets, with frequent accessions, which will probably make the aggregate attendance nearly one hundred, before the end of the session. Another year should add to Gen. Colston's Academy at least fifty cadets from other quarters of the State.

-Says the Weldon News: Judge Watts adjourned the Court for this county on Wednesday evening, having gone over the State docket since Monday. Of this extreme haste and its results we will allude to a moment. We have but two Superior Courts a year under existing ffairs, and as a consequence an immense amount of business comes before them. while in the meantime, in criminal cases, the county is at the expense of feeding its prisoners. Judge Watts convened his Court on Tuesday of last week and ad-journed it on Friday evening, having had under consideration the criminal docket. This docket had upon it one hundred and seventy-five cases—of this number seventyfive were considered, the remainder not having been taken up; of the hundred some twenty-five were cases of submission, leaving seventy-five to go over until the next session of the Court. The Court met again on Monday, when the civil docket, containing some five hundred cases, was taken up. This docket was gotten through with in three days, but a large number of the cases were continued upon the slightest excuse. And thus is entailed upon the county all the expense resulting from a continuance of business that could and should have been attended to during this Court. In the present impoverished condition of the people, we consider this unnecessary expense and delay an outrage.
