THE ANNUAL FAIR OF THE CAPE FEAR AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION. THIRD AND FOURTH DAYS.

AN IMMENSE CROWD IN ATTENDANCE. THE ANNUAL ADDRESS BY JUDGE HOWARD.

TRIALS OF SPEED, &c., &c., &c. Thursday morning dawned brightly and beautifully upon the anxious crowds who were waiting for the starting of the first train for the Fair Grounds.

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SECOND ANNUAL MEETING OF C. F. A. A. Meeting held pursuant to adjournment on Thursday evening, Nov. 18th, at the President in the Chair.

The minutes were read and approved. Hon. R. W. Best made explanations in regard to the action of the State Agricultural Society in permitting a horse Fair to be held on the grounds at the same time of the Fair.

Gen. Ransom introduced Mr. Evans, a delegate from S. C., who was on motion invited to take part in the proceedings. Gen. G. W. Lewis, delegate from the State Agricultural Society in regard to the horse Fair in Raleigh, fully exonerated the officers of the Society from all blame in the matter.

Maj. Engelhard stated that he had received a letter from Hon. K. P. Battle, President of the Society, regretting the position they were unavoidably placed in. Dr. S. S. Satchwell offered the following resolutions which were adopted.

Resolved, That the explanations just offered, coming through the representatives of the State Agricultural Society, the conflict of time with the Fair of the Cape Fear Agricultural Association and the "Horse Fair" now being held at Raleigh is regretted, while we regret the occurrence of the "Horse Fair" in the infancy of our struggle to advance the interests of our Association in the face of the opposition which we have encountered, and while, above all, we wish to be true to ourselves and to our section, we nevertheless reciprocate the cordiality and sympathy and friendship received from the State Agricultural Society, and beg to assure them of our desire for harmony, peace, friendship and co-operation in all matters pertaining to the good of agricultural science, the commerce and manufactures, internal improvements, and general good and honor of North Carolina.

Resolved, That the President of this Association be requested to forward a copy of these resolutions to the State Agricultural Society. Professor Kerr appearing, he was invited to take a seat with the Association. Maj. J. S. Hines offered the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association are due and gratefully tendered to the officers of the Association, and especially to the Executive Committee for the highly creditable manner in which they have discharged the duties assigned to them by the Association. Resolved, That the thanks of the Association be also tendered to the various Railroad and other companies who have so liberally and so graciously aided this Association in the carrying out of its annual Fair.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Association be also tendered to the citizens of Wilmington for the very hospitable manner in which they have received and entertained the visiting public on all occasions. On motion of Dr. S. S. Satchwell the Association proceeded to go into an election of officers for the ensuing year.

On motion of Col. W. L. Steele Col. S. L. Fremont was unanimously elected President of the Association for the ensuing year by acclamation. Col. Fremont replied in a well timed and pleasing speech. The following gentlemen were elected as Vice Presidents for the various counties represented: Gen. A. Dockery, Richmond county; Col. Memory, Columbus county; J. S. Woodward, Wilson county; T. C. McIlhenny, Brunswick county; A. A. McCoy, Sampson county; D. MacMillan, New Hanover county; Gov. H. T. Clark, Edgecombe county; C. J. O'Hagen, Pitt county; Alex. MacRae, Robeson county; J. C. McMillan, Duplin county; D. Murchison, Cumberland county; T. D. McDowell, Bladen county; E. W. Foville, Onslow county; P. E. Smith, Halifax county; W. S. Mullins, Marion, S. C.; S. W. Cole, Anson county; R. T. Fulghum, Wayne county; W. T. Atkinson, Johnson county.

J. C. Mann was then unanimously elected Recording Secretary by acclamation. W. L. Smith was unanimously elected Treasurer by acclamation. Essay by Col. Cameron on Wine was then read by Col. W. L. Steele. On motion, the thanks of the Association were tendered to Col. Cameron for his interesting and instructive address. Gen. Robt. Ransom offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Association has witnessed with much satisfaction the drill of the Cadets of the Cape Fear Academy under the command of Gen. E. E. Colston, and that in testimony of our appreciation of our Fair we tender them a flag; and that the Executive Committee be authorized to carry this resolution into effect. An essay on the manufacture of wine by L. F. Freilich was then read and the thanks of the Association tendered. A. H. Yan Bokkelen then offered the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Association fully appreciate the courtesy of Gen. Bumford, commanding 8th Regiment U. S. Infantry, in responding to the request of the President to allow the attendance of the band of said regiment at this, the first Annual Fair, and now return their thanks to the members of the said band for their services in adding so much to the attractions of the Fair. Resolved, That the Secretary transmit a copy of these resolutions to Gen. Bumford. Dr. McBeck then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association be tendered to the Chief Marshal and his Assistants for their efficient fulfillment of the duties assigned to them. On motion of Dr. S. S. Satchwell, the thanks of the Association were tendered to Col. Dockery and other members of Congress for valuable books, documents, &c., presented by them to this Association. The meeting then adjourned, to meet again at the call of the Executive Committee.
