DRESSINGS FOR BURNS.-A gentleman named Fox relates that, through the explosion of a spirit lamp, the greater portion of his face had been covered with rather deep burns. These healed in a week by the immediate and oft-repeated application of glycerine, without the production of blisters or festering, or leaving any scar. Dr. Lange, of Pittsburg, describes a case of burning of both legs, caused by a whole case of hot sand suddenly falling on these parts, which he dressed with flannel cloths soaked in eight parts of linseed oil and one of the commercial carbolic acid. " At first the pain was slightly augmented, but in a few moments relief was experienced; continued this dressing for four days, but a slight trace of suppuration appearing along the edges. At the end of this time removed the acid dressing, substituting simple cerate, a new skin having been formed. The case did well; the burn bealed rapidly."
