Special Court.

The following is the substitute extending the jurisdiction and recommended by the committee on the judiciary to the Bill to abolish this tribunal, viz: The General Assembly of North Carolina enact as follows, viz:

I. The Special Court for the city of Wilmington, shall hereafter have exclusive original jurisdiction to hear, try and determine the misdemeanors hereinafter recited committed within the corporate and charcaged, yesterday afternoon, for disorderly ter limits of the city of Wilmington, as the same are now or shall be bereafter defined by law, viz: 1st. Petty Larcenies or the stealing of any goods, wares, money or other things actually worth, or representing in value no greater sum than twentyfive dollars, or receiving the same knowing any Ordinance or By-Law of said city pass ed to prevent disorderly conduct, when the penalty or forfeiture incurred shall notex ceed one hundred dollars. And for the purposes of this act and to make such larceny or violation cognizable and determinable in the court, aforesaid the same are hereby declared petty misdemeanors II. Upon the trial of any such petty misdemeanors in said court, it shall appear in the complaint and in proof as follows, viz: First, that the offence was committed or the penalty incurred within the charter or corporate limits of the city of Wilmingand within six months. Second, such complaint need not be in any particular form. It must appear to be made without collusion between the complainant and accused. Third, that it be made by the injured party himself, in writing

III. The said court shall have no jurisdicion over civil contracts, nor in cases of larceny, nor of any other misdemeanor, where the penalty shall exceed one hundred dollars, or the punishment shall be imprisonment in the state pen-tentiary; nor shall there be any Jury Trials in said

IV. In all such cases, it shall be the duty of the Judge of said court to require from the accused a recogizance with sufficient sure-ties for his appearance at the next term of the proper Superior Court, then and there to sustain the charge. The com-plainant and witnesses shall also in like manner be recognized to appear and testify, and the papers, together with the pro-ceedings of said Court shall be returned to the Clerk of the proper Superior Court, on or bofore the first day of the next term thereo In detault of such security, the Judge may commit the accused and the witnesses, or either of them to prison, as

Said Court shall continue to be held at the City Hall, in the city of Wilmington, every day (Sunday's and holiday's excepted) for at least two hours (if the business shall so require) and the Marshal of the city shall be the Sheriff ot said Court. He shall attend the same, open and adjourn its sittings, and execute all its process and orders. The Cleek thereof, shall be appointed by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city; he shall i-sue the process of the Court and keep the minutes, ecords, and archives of the same; he shall give such bond as the Mayor and Aldermen shall direct and approve. Such bond shall be made payable to the city of Wilmington, but any person endamaged

may sue thereon. VI. The party convicted shall pay the costs in all cases, and if the party charged be acquitted, the complainant may be adjudged to pay the same and be imprison ed for the nonpayment thereof. In all cases before said court, the same fees and costs, only shall be taxed as are allowed by law for like services in the justices courts, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties recovered and adjudged shall and may be collected and enforced as city fines and penalties are naw collected and enforce i by law and are then to be paid into the City Treasury, The compensation of the Clerk and Marshall shall be annually ascertained and established by the Mayor and Aldermen of said city. The Judge of said court in addition to the annual salary of one thousand dollars, and in lieu of the compensation heretofore required for him from the county of New Hanover, shall be the City Treasury and the county allow-

ance shall thereupon cease.
VII. All persons tried in said Court shall have the same right of appeal, and on the same terms as are now given from (Sunday) morning, thence to Pine Forest Cemthe Superior Court, and the finding and etery. sentence in every case in said city Court, when not appealed from being duly certified under the seal of said Court, may be pleaded in bar to any indictment, or prose-

pleaded in bar to any indicated, or proceed oution thereafter, for the same offence.

VIII. All laws, and clauses of laws in conflict with this act, shall be, and the same are hereby repealed, and this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Cumberland Superior Court.

Superior Court began here on Monday 15th inst, for Cumberland County, Judge R. P. Buxton presiding. The term will hold through the two weeks and not finish all the business. The court opened with some 30 cases on the State docket (criminal) and about 500 cases on the civil docket. Some 50 more cases were added to the State docket by the Grand Jury this term making 80 in all. Perhaps 10 of these may be continued—the balance are disposed of. Most of these too were very trivial larceny cases among negroes. There is no important criminal case, nor penitentiary offence. Probably not more han 250 or 300 cases on the civil docket will be disposed of or ended this term. Some 200 debt cases (by plain note admitting of formal judgment) will be ended and judgment and execution follow.
