ASSAULT AND BATTERY. The case of Jack Hooper, arrested on Thursday last on the charge of committing an assault on the person of Caroline Hall (col.) came up before Justice McQuigg yesterday.

WIFE-BEATING. A colored man, by the name of John Jackson, was arrested Friday night, by the Police, charged with beating his wife, besides being guilty of cutting up other disgraceful capers.

ESCAPED. We learn that a colored convict, by the name of Andrew Wells, escaped from the Workhouse on Tuesday night last and has not yet been recaptured.

ANOTHER INQUEST. - CORONER ELKANAH ALLEN, having been duly notified of the death of the white woman noticed in yesterday's STAR as having been found dead in her bed at Burgaw, in this county, will proceed to hold an inquest over the body to-day at 12 o'clock.

RELEASED. - CORNELIUS RIDDICK, who was arrested on Friday, charged with "stealing" another colored man to the tune of \$90.50, and whose examination was announced to take place before Justice McQuigg, yesterday morning, at 11 o'clock, was released from custody, no one appearing to prosecute in the case.

SUPERIOR COURT. The Special term of the Superior Court for this county commences in this city to-morrow morning, His Honor, Judge Russell, presiding. We learn that the cases on the civil docket number about nine hundred and sixty, and that the Court will continue in session until all are disposed of.

A DARING ROBBERY. We regret to learn that some thief or thieves went on board of the steamer Brandt, lying at the wharf in the rear of Messrs. Harris & Howell's, yesterday morning, about 10 o'clock; during the temporary absence of the person in charge, and stole all the clothing, &c., belonging to Capt. Harper. His opera glasses were also taken, the case being left behind. No clue to the robbers.

WILL BE FIXED. We are assured that the pavement on the North side of Market, between Second and Third streets, will be laid as soon as the necessary brick can be obtained. They have already been contracted for at the County Workhouse, and as there is a kiln containing about 240,000 now undergoing the necessary hardening process, there is a prospect of soon obtaining all the brick desired for the purpose.

MORE PIG. - As an offset to our "Some Pig" item in our last, we are informed that Mr. Ira Skipper, of this city, killed a common woods hog, a few days since, which was only eight months old and weighed 214 pounds. THE BAGGING FOUND. - We learn that the bagging which enclosed the two bales of cotton noticed in our paper yesterday as having been stolen from the Wilmington, Char. and Rutherford R. R. depot, a few nights since, was found in the dock at the foot of Mulberry street, yesterday, where it had doubtless been thrown by the thieves.
