"THIEVES BREAK THROUGH AND STEAL."—We learn that, on Saturday night last, a thief entered a dwelling on one of the principal streets of the city, while the family were at tea in the basement, went into the bed-room and appropriated a quantity of bed-clothing and other articles.

MOUNTS THE TRIP OD.—We were handed, on Saturday evening last, a circular, from which we learn that our old friend Capt. Benj. Robinson, late of Fayetteville, and formerly the accomplished editor of the Dispatch, of this city, has again determined to try the newspaper business.

INFORMATION WANTED.—Of Major Phillip W. Plummer, of the 6th Wisconsin Infantry Volunteers, who was supposed to have been killed at the Battle of the Wilderness, but afterwards reported to be at Andersonville prison, where he got well of his wound, but subsequently died of chronic diarrhoea.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.—The old Board met for the last time yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, Mayor Neff in the chair. The report of the City Marshal was received and ordered to be printed.

REPORT OF THE CITY MARSHAL.—From the report of Marshal W. P. Cannaday, submitted to the Board of Aldermen yesterday, we glean the following facts:

There have been 1255 arrests made during the past year, Policeman Wolcott making the largest number. Cases have been disposed of as follows: 553 cases dismissed; 22 cases, fined \$1,050, took appeal; 681 were fined \$8,526.

The street hands under A. J. Denton have laid \$3,450 feet of new gutters and taken up and relaid 2,420 feet, making 6,050 feet of gutters during the year.

REMARKABLE ESCAPE.—It will be remembered that on last Saturday a week ago, a colored man by the name of Schuyler Hooper, who was employed in assisting on the wrecked steamer Lucile, got into a surf boat for the purpose of bailing her out, and while so engaged she broke from her fastenings and drifted out through the Inlet into the open sea.

LOSS BY FIRES IN THE CITY.—The loss by fires in the city during the year amounts to only \$59,200. The Marshal advises the appointment of a Board of Health, to consist of three or five physicians, with a clerk to keep a mortuary record, said Board to have power to pass ordinances subject to the approval of the Board of Aldermen.

QUICK RUN.—The Steamship Pioneer arrived at this city yesterday from Philadelphia, having made the run in 49 hours and 5 minutes from wharf to wharf, waiting at the Bar 4 hours and 20 minutes for the tide.
