Eborn, one of the wrecked vessels brought the news, he having walked to this city from the scene of the disaster. Three of the vessels went ashore yesterday morning, about 9 o'clock, whilst the fourth was stranded about 4 p'clock. The names of the vessels are as follows: The Schr. Samuel C. Eborn, Capt. James H. Farrow, from Hyde county, ashore about four or five miles North of Fort Fisher, with a cargo of about nine hundred bushels of corn. Schr. Rager, Capt.
