

of six or seven years is 'rather an abstract one at present; when that time arrives it is to be aboved that we will, including "M. T. D.," have more information on the subject. Again, he says that "the table shews that the probability is that every share of the Association will be redeemed, which appears to me to be unlikely, to say the least." He certainly could not have seen, or if he had seen, he certainly could not have understood the meaning of the word "average" where the table says "average rates of redemption," at the head of the column. Your readers will of course understand that the rates of redemption will probably be more or less favorable at the different stages of the Association's existence,

and are of course aware that some Stockhold ers will wait till the close for their \$200; but those of us who have studied the workings of other Associations of a like nature in other cities, know that very few, if any, wait till the very end—there will always, even to the fast, be found Stockholders who, if they are not willing to have redeemed, will be willing to sell their stock to the Association at less than it is actually worth, in preference to waiting for the full amount a few weeks or months longcr. I saw in a Norfolk paper a few days ago an advectisement of a Building Association there, where the Directors offer to buy on its behalf its own stock from the holders at 30 per cent. premium.

Again, with regard to the "Book Value of Stock," "M. D. T." adopts a different method of calculation from the table, and says his way "is the only one contemplated by the Constitu-tion and By Laws," This assertion, did we not know otherwise, and that he was likely one of the converts to the Building Associaion ideas at "the eleventh hour" after the Constitutions were written, would lead one to believe that he had something to do with the framing of the Constitutions. It is a particulary hold assertion to come from one who, as he says himself in another paragraph in his com-munication, "is not prepared to give any re-liable information as to the result of the inwestment," and more particularly so, when hundreds of other Associations in Baltimore, hundreds of other Associations in Baltimore, Norfolk, and elsewhere, (several of whose statements I have now before me) calculate the "Book Value" as the Building Associations in this City do, and as is done in the table. To prove the correctness of the value of stock as laid down in the table, take the value as represented there, say in December 1873 : It is \$101 13. Suppose each Stockholder, then, by ananimous consent, agreed to pay \$38 87 dnes in advance to wind up the Association, would not the sums so advanced amount to \$295,610 —which would be a fraction more than suf-ficient to pay \$200 on each of the 1,483 shares ficient to pay \$200 on each of the 1,483 share

--which would be a fraction more than suf-ficient to pay \$200 on each of the 1,483 shares which the table represents as them unre-deemed, and would release the mortgages of those, who had released? When the Stock-holder put the \$200 in his pocket where be-fore he only had \$35 87, would be not then feel that he had made the profit of \$101 13? Again: If the Association starts out to re-deem \$000 shares, is it not reasonable to sup-pose that when 1,500 be had fore redeemed that the Associations have half completed their ex-istence, and that the stock, consequently, ought to be worth half the ultimate amount? If further proof a necessary, that the rela-tive of "boak rates" of abok is correctly had down in the table, we find it in the state-ment of "M. D. T." himself, in the last para-graph of his communication, where he says that he "does not touch on the question of the life of the Association and believes the question of time is about correct." In other words, even he, with all his caviling about all the stock not being redeemed at a discount, admits that the Association will wind up in the time fail down in the table; or, in other words, that the stock in seven years at farthest, the time laid down in the table; or, in other words, that the stock in seven years at farthest, as there iald down, will be worth \$200. Now, I would ask, if he admits that, why should he not admit that at the end of the eixth year it is worth \$173 26, at the end of the fifth year \$144 66, and so on? Or what particular time is it that, in his opinion, the discounts from the redeemed shares become "actual astets" to the Association. He says that the discounts are not items of value at all; that they are sim-ply " put on the books for the purpose of get-ting off balance sheets."
