tractions of the 22d inst., I proceeded immedistely to the scene of the recent accident on the South Carolina Railroad, in which the colored porter, Caleb Davis, was killed, and Messrs. M. K. Jessup and --- Dodge and their wives were injured, and beg leave to submit he following report of the cause which led to the seedent and maintail all one By a careful examination of the track I found it at least two inches out of gauge, and where

the wheel dropped in, on the inside of the track, the rail, was worn off at least a half nob, making the track two and one-half inches wider than the right gauge. My impression is that the sudden putting on of brakes and stopping the lateral motions of truck, caused the wheel to drop inside the track, running some forty feet before any other wheel left the track. The cause was not from any defect of wheels or truck. All of which I respectfully submit for consideration.
