How to Force Radishes.

and every citizen of our State demand it.

Radishes may be grown in a few days by the following somewhat singular method: Let some good radish seed soak in water for fiftyfour hours, then put them in a bag exposed to the sun. In the course of the day germination will commence. The seed must then be sowed in a well-manured hot bed, and watered from time to time with lukewarm water. By this treatment the radishes will, in a very short 1870. time, acquire a sufficient bulk, and be good to June 1. Amount received of citizens. \$1,041 13 eat. If it be required to get good radishes in winter, during the severe cold, an old cask should be sown in two, and one-half of it filled with good earth. The radish seed, beginning to shoot before, must then be sowed in, the other half of the barrel put on the top of the full one, and the whole apparatus carried down into the cellar.
