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Local Notes.

We hear of a number of Sound excursions on the taptis for the 4th of July. The Steamship Lucette arrived from New York yesterday.

Committee Meeting. The Executive Committee of the Conservative party of New Hanover county met in the City yesterday, for the purpose of taking the necessary steps to bring out the full strength of the party in this county for Hon. Wm. M. Shipps for Attorney-General, and Col. R. T. Bennett for Congress.

It was resolved that a canvasser and an alternate for each Township be appointed by the Chairman, whose duty it shall be to advocate the claims of Mr. Shipps and Col. Bennett. The following were appointed:

On motion, the Canvassers were instructed to appoint a working committee of five in each of their respective Townships, charged with the duty of securing a full registration of our party strength.

Meeting Last Night.

According to previous announcement, the friends of the proposed connection with One-way county by rail assembled at the Court House last evening. Col. R. H. Cowan acted as Chairman and M. Cronly, Esq., as Secretary. Col. Fremont presented the report of the Committee.

Whereas, it is of great importance to the business men of this city as well as to the agricultural interests of the County of Onslow that a railway should be made between Wilmington and some point on the New River; therefore,

Resolved, That it is the sense of the people of this city that a communication of railway shall be effected at the earliest day practicable and by the best route, all interests being considered.

Resolved, That the chairman of this meeting be requested to appoint fifteen delegates to attend a railroad meeting to be held at Jacksonville on the 4th of July next.

The chairman of the Onslow branch of the W. & W. R. R. was presented and Mr. McMillan explained the route and its advantages. Mr. Parsley favored the direct connection with Onslow, skirting the Sound with terminals at Stone Bay as possessing more practical advantages and profit to the city, and that a road direct could be built for two-thirds if not one-half of the branch road.

Considerable discussion was had as to the practicability of the different routes. Mr. Parsley moved that a Committee be appointed to solicit subscriptions for an amount sufficient to cover the expense of a preliminary survey by the seacoast route.

The Chair appointed the following said Committee: W. L. DeRosset, D. R. Murchison, F. W. Kercher, M. Cronly, W. A. Cumming, Roger Moore. Col. DeRosset suggested that the Delegates appointed to attend the meeting at Jacksonville co-operate with the Committee under the foregoing resolution, to enable them to report at that meeting.

The Thermometer. The state of the thermometer in our office yesterday at 4 o'clock indicated 88 degrees. To give our readers some idea of the state of the atmosphere in other localities we give the range of the thermometer at several points on Saturday, the 25th inst. In Lewistown, Me., it went as high as 106 degrees. In Portland it stood at 123 in the sun and 96 in the shade. In Boston it was at 94 in the shade. In Chicago it went as high as 92; at Cambridge, Iowa, 100; at Oshkosh, Wis., 93; at Madison, Wis., 98; at Rochelle, Ill., 99; at Des Moines, Iowa, 92; at Janesville, Wis., 97; at Aurora, Ill., 105; at Albany, N. Y., 105; at Rochester, 85; at St. Louis it ranged from 92 to 98 degrees. The highest it has reached here was 94, which it touched on Tuesday.
