Under the new system of stamps, envelopes a new scale of prices at which the same will be sold has been prepared at the Post Office Department, and will be issued to postmasters before October 1. Under this scale the envelopes will be sold at prices lower than at present.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Cape Fear Building Association, held last evening, twenty-six shares of stock were sold at from \$25.00 to \$30.00, an average of about \$28 per share.

The Street Railway Company, where the track crosses the streets, of keeping it in such a condition that loaded vehicles and teams can pass over it without difficulty. We mention this because in some localities at the corner of Front and [Street], for instance, the difficulty of crossing is so great that many drivers find it necessary, or at least preferable, to turn the corner for some distance before crossing, in order to obviate the strain which their horses would be subjected to by crossing at the usual place.

The city authorities, we learn, are soon to make a deed to the Trustees of Pine Forest Cemetery of the land purchased for that purpose in 1909, and it is expected that improvements of the grounds will commence at once. There is no reason why this Cemetery should not vie with Oakdale in beauty and adornment. We suggest a plan for its improvement, which we have heard is frequently adopted in the New England States. That is, let those who are unable to give money, give one, two or three days labor, as they can best afford. In such a case labor is money, and counts just as good as cash. We say to our colored people, that respect for the dead and a well kept Cemetery are unmistakable signs of civilization and cultivation.

The Board met at 8 o'clock. It was ordered that the late Clerk and Treasurer of the Board be requested to furnish the Board with a condensed statement setting forth the receipts and expenditures for the last two years, together with the assets of the county so far as ascertained.

Ordered that a license be granted to H. B. Street to retail spirituous liquors at the corner of Mulberry and Water streets.

Ordered that the Finance Committee, with the power to act, shall have in charge the remission of any taxes unlawfully or erroneously laid on the tax list of 1910.

Ordered that a certificate be issued to W. J. Bivens, empowering him to enter upon the discharge of his duties as Register of Deeds.

Mr. Wood appeared and duly qualified by taking the oaths required by law. The bond of Owen Fennell, Jr., as County Treasurer, for \$10,000, with Messrs. Eli Murray, F. Murphy, J. R. Beaman, Wm. Larkins and B. F. Mitchell as sureties, was presented and approved, and Mr. Fennell duly qualified.

Yesterdays afternoon it was reported that a young man, apparently a stranger, had been discovered in a tenement and perhaps dying condition, near Blossom's Distillery, in the Northwest section of the city. It was stated that he had been in that condition a greater part of the day, and that nothing could be done for him to give any indication as to who he was or where he came from. Dr. J. S. Wainwright, the Hospital physician, was in the form of the fact, and he reported to the police station, where he found the young man in the condition described, utterly helpless and speechless. His hands being unfastened, he finally revived sufficiently to inform the physician that his name was Joseph [Name] and that he came to this place from Fayetteville about two or three weeks ago, to look for work. He had not been able to secure any, his money had given out, and he had no recourse to look to in his extremity, and being well, he had finally been reduced to this condition.
