"The guns lately in position before Stras-bourg are being hurried to Paris. Some have already arrived. "The Prussian headquarters of the King are at Ferrieres; those of the Crown Prince at Versailles, and the Crown Prince of Suxony at Grand Fremblay. "Carrier pigeons are the only means of coun-munication between Paris and Tours. The balloons offered too fair a mark for the Prus-sians.

"The railway between Chalons and the Ger-man border has been relaid."

Towns, Sept. 29. The government publishes a dispatch this morning from the French Consul at Basle, contradicting the surrender of Strasbourg. The Prussians made 8 tremendons, but unsuc-cessful assaults. A white flag was subsequent-ly displayed for a truce to bury the dead, which gave rise to the rumor that the city was captured. Its early fall, however, is probable and, notwithstanding the denial of the Consul at Basic, there is a strong belief that the ru-mor is not croundless. mor is not groundless.






