Latest from Robeson.

Our latest intelligence from Robeson confirms the death of Geo. Applewhite, one of the desperadoes, which had heretofore been reported, though with some doubt as to its correctness, in the STAR. Applewhite was one of the most desperate of the gang, and at the time of his escape, from our county jail was under the sentence of death for complicity in murder of the late Sheriff

We learn that the gang of desperadoes appeared at the place where Applewhite's body was found, on last Monday morning, and fired off about one hundred guns, as if in defiance, and to show that though one of their number had been slain thera was still a plenty left to continue the outrages upon the defenceless people and to avenge his death.

Applewhite was killed in the first encounter between the outlaws and the pursuers on the occasion of the latter being ambushed and fired upon, and to the brave and chivalrous Davis, who afterwards died from wounds received during the conflict, belongs the honor, we learn, of having sent the cut-throat to his reward. With Applewhite dead and Shoemaker John, another of the outlaws, in the county jail at Fayetteville, where we are informed he was incarcerated on last Saturday the county has been relieved of two of the gang. With promptness and efficiency on the part of the authorities of Robeson, we may expect to hear of still further captures.

Since writing the above, we learn that Mr. W. S. McDlarmid, Editor of the Lumberton Robesonian, has been arrested by Magistrate James Sinclair on the charge of contempt of his Court, the foundation of the charge, we learn, being certain strictures which appeared in his paper a few days since in regard to his (Sinclair's) official conduct. The investigation of the case, we are informed, was to have taken place yesterday afternoon. In the absence of any definite information; in regard to the matter, we forbear comment.
