The N. C. Beneficial Association.

We were present on Friday and witnessed the drawing at the office of the N. C. Bene ficial Association, on Second street. The operation is very simple, but at the same time it appears impossible that any unfairness can be practiced. There were twelve numbers drawn, seventy-eight numbers having first been placed in small tubes, then put into the large glass wheel which has lately taken the place of the small one formerly used, and thoroughly mixed by the turning of the wheel. A small boy, blindfolded, then draws the numbers out one by one, the wheel being again turned after each number is taken out. Each number, as it is taken out, is handed by the person at the wheel to the sworn Commissioner, who records it in a book kept for the purpose. The Commissioner superintends the entire proceedings in connection with the

Active preparations are in progress for the grand drawing which takes place on the 1st of December. In a room in the second story, over the office, a couple of ladies are engaged in preparing the tickets, which, in this case, are inserted in small brass rings instead of tubes. There are to be 10,000 of these tickets, from which 100 prizes will be drawn, varying in value from \$5,000 to \$50. The tickets will be placed in the large wheel, and the prizes to correspond with the lucky numbers will be placed in the small wheel. The process of arranging the tickets is under the immediate supervision of the Commissioner, and when he is compelled to leave the room ar any purpose the work is suspended until he returns. The grand drawing will take place in the Theatre, which will be open to the public.
