It seems that he had been complaining of feeling bad for several days past, but was up Saturday evening when his niece, who lived in the house with him, went out to attend to some business. She remained away about an hour and when she returned he was discovered lying on the bed and upon examination proved to be quite dead. A verdict was returned that deceased came to his death from causes unknown to the jury. Deceased was about 60 years old.

Died on the Journey. Mr. D. Merchant, of Jersey City, N. J., quietly breathed his last at the Parcell House in this city at half past 9 o'clock on Saturday night last. Deceased, in company with his wife, was on his way to Florida, in the hope that the mild climate of that section would result in some benefit to his health, which was steadily giving way under the ravages of consumption. He arrived here on Thursday, the 24th inst., very much worn and fatigued and stopped to rest for a few days before proceeding further on his journey. He commenced growing rapidly worse, and it was soon plain to all that his end was near. Rev. Mr. Singleton, of the First Presbyterian Church, was by his side and administered the consolations of religion. He received every attention and care possible to bestow, and though a stranger in a strange place, he was surrounded by sympathetic hearts, who soothed his last moments with their affectionate ministrations. His brother was telegraphed to and arrived, but too late to see him before he died. The body was enclosed in a neat and handsome metallic coffin, and after appropriate services, by Rev. Mr. Singleton, yesterday, all that was mortal of the poor traveler whose journey to the flowery land of the South was so suddenly and sadly brought to a close, was placed on board the steamship Regulator to be taken on to his last resting place in his Northern home.

Local Notes.

—Mills are much smaller. —Quiet colors are coming in favor. —The City Hospital now has 25 patients. —Two colored children were sent to the Poor House yesterday. —The fish market yesterday was well supplied with every variety. —The oil of sunflower seeds is now worked over into a delicious perfume. —The usual number of cases were disposed of by the City Court yesterday morning. —Tax payers will have to be expeditious in settling their city taxes, or they will be advertised. —On the 15th of next month, we learn, the City Treasurer will commence the payment of the interest due on city bonds January 1st, 1871, in cash. —An immense congregation was present at the Lutheran Church on Sunday evening, on which occasion the services were commemorative of the Reformation.

—Stephen Coker, a colored man confined in the Work House, was taken suddenly ill on Saturday evening and died before the physician, who had been sent for, could reach him. —We are informed that there is any quantity of granite on the line of the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, which can be delivered in this city at a rate not exceeding the price of brick.

—A young lady, hearing a noise at her window a few night since, rose, and discovered a ferocious burglar. With rare presence of mind she clapped her hands, exclaiming "Scat you devil," and the ruffian fled. —Wm. Logan, white, was arraigned before Justice McQuigg, yesterday, on the charge of larceny. He was required to give security in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at court, in default of which he was committed to jail.

—The announcement is made that Pearce's new and improved map of North Carolina is now completed and will soon be ready for delivery. It is beautifully finished and is mounted on rollers four by five feet in size. Agents wanted in every part of the State who will apply to Rev. Samuel Pearce or Mr. Alfred Williams, Raleigh.

—We are informed that the North Carolina Beneficial Association have generously offered to give to the Ladies' Benevolent Society all the commissions arising from the sale of certificates in the grand distribution from this date inclusive till the hour of distribution, which we trust will amount to a sum which will materially aid that charitable society.

Popular Amusements. Rev. J. C. Hiden will deliver a lecture at the First Baptist Church on the above subject this (Tuesday) evening, Nov. 29th. The price of admission will be 25 cents—tickets to be had at the Book Stores and at the First National Bank.

Sent to the Hospital. Superintendent Van Amringe reported to the Mayor, yesterday, that Benj. Mason, who was sentenced to the Work House for three months during the late term of the Superior Court for forgery, was in the last stages of consumption, and if not removed to different quarters he would speedily die. He was therefore granted permission to enter the City Hospital.

Grand Chapter. The Grand Chapter of North Carolina will meet at St. John's Hall in this city on Wednesday morning, at 10 o'clock. Mr. Wm. Munday of Salisbury, Grand High Priest, arrived last evening and is stopping with Dr. T. B. Carr. The announcement heretofore made in these columns, that the Grand Chapter would meet on Monday, was of course erroneous, we having been misled by a contemporary.

Board of Aldermen. The Board convened in regular monthly session last evening. We give a synopsis of the proceedings: It was ordered that an appropriation of \$100 be made to defray the expenses incurred in getting signatures to a petition to Congress to obtain a new Postoffice. Certain resolutions in regard to this subject will appear to-morrow.

A resolution was adopted, urging upon Congress the claims of our harbor and Bar to liberal appropriations from the government. A petition from the police force asking that the authorities pay one-half of the expense of their new uniforms, was granted. John Wm. Strauss was granted a recommendation for license to retail spirituous liquors.

Petition of Jas. C. Hill and others for the repair of the street corner of 4th and Wooster was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves, an ordinance relative to the piling of wood upon the wharves was referred to the Mayor.

Report of Committee, which was adverse to the claim of Louis Collins for a portion of Princess street, was concurred in. The Board adjourned to the 1st Wednesday in December.

THE TOURNAMENT AT FAYETTEVILLE.

[SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE OF THE STAR.] FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 26. DEAR STAR.—Yesterday was the day set apart for the grand tournament that was to close the exposition of the Cumberland Agricultural Society, in successful operation for several days. Contrary to the sanguine anticipations of all, the day was exceedingly unpropitious for the occasion, rain having fallen in torrents during the entire morning and was so persistent in its efforts as to dispel all hope from every mind of witnessing the most graceful riding of the twenty-four gallant knights who had entered the lists to contend for the various prizes and honors incident to the tourney. But determined not to be deprived of their enjoyment and exhibition of skill in the equine accomplishment the contestants entered the field, and about 1 o'clock the tilting commenced. The riding was beautiful and graceful throughout, but for fear we trespass on your valuable space, only the most prominent features of the contest will be mentioned.

On the first three rides the "Knight of the Distant Hills," Mr. W. L. Williams, and the "Knight of Cumberland," Mr. John A. Williams, Jr., tied, each making 33 points out of 36, the full number. On the ride for the decision of the tie, the "Knight of the Distant Hills" was declared victor, which entitled him to the first prize—a handsome buggy valued at \$300—and the honor of crowning the "Queen of Love and Beauty." He named Miss Alice Campbell.

"Knight of Cumberland," named Miss Fannie Luterloh, of Fayetteville, First "Maid of Honor." "Knight of Linden," Mr. J. M. Hodges—third successful rider—chose as Second "Maid of Honor" Miss Sallie McNeill, of Harnett.

"Knight of Roseville," Mr. R. B. Luterloh—4th victorious rider—selected Miss Ida Haughton, of Pittsboro, as Third "Maid of Honor."

After the riding was finished the championship for the most superior horsemanship was warmly contested for by six of the riders, and the judges being unable to decide upon the point, the prize—a handsome pair of spurs—was awarded, by lot, the "Knight of the Coast," Mr. J. B. McMillan of New Hanover.

We should have mentioned above that Mr. Jno. A. Williams, "Knight of Cumberland," received the 2d prize—a very handsome set of harness.

The riding throughout was the best ever in this, and we venture to say in any other, community. Out of the 24 knights only four were ruled out, having failed to make 18 points, the limit—and of the four victors the lowest number of points made was 28.

THE BALL, given in compliment to the Knights, was largely attended by the elite and beauty of this and surrounding counties, and the density of the mass of gay and festive devotees of Terpsichore conducted to some discomfort.

THE CROWNING, of the "Queen," and her "Maids" took place at about 9 o'clock, and then commenced the mazy dance, nor did the lovely and gay participants tire of the inspiring scene till the "morn'g we hours of the morning" were far advanced.

THE SPEECHES on the occasion were very appropriate and delivered in polished language; and particularly was the neat and pretty little speech of the Queen admired, as well as was her regal form as she gracefully tripped the "light fantastic toe."

THE MAIDS OF HONOR shone brilliantly among the happy sea of sweet and charming faces who, with their dazzling eyes, lent a sparkling light to the almost radiant scene.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY. We make up the following brief summary of the proceedings of the Legislature on Saturday from the report in the Sentinel of Sunday: Mr. Graham introduced a resolution in the Senate declaring a vacancy existing in the 24th Senatorial District (Caswell county), and authorizing the Governor to issue his proclamation for an election to be held in said District. Mr. Graham urged immediate action.

Messrs. Moore, Lehman and Olds spoke in opposition to the resolution, and urged the postponement of the resolution to the 1st of December next. Messrs. Jones, Gilmer, Dargan, Speed, Flemming, McClammy, Allen and Welch, followed in able arguments in support of the resolution and for immediate action thereupon.

The resolution finally passed by a vote of 33 to 11. A motion to print the Governor's message and accompanying documents was laid on the table for the present.
