LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY

We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the reports in the Sentinel:

SENATE

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. By Mr. Graham: Bill to incorporate the Yanceyville, Danville and Coalfield Railroad Co.; referred to the committee on Internal Improvements.

By Mr. Troy: Bill to incorporate the Fayetteville Independent Bucket Company; referred to the committee on Corporations.

By Mr. McClammy: Bill to amend section 16, title 4, chapter 1 of the Code of Civil Procedure; referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

RESOLUTIONS INTRODUCED

By Mr. Adams, resolution of enquiry of Governor Holden, relative to his authority to declare a county in a state of insurrection, as to troops being sent into certain counties, by whose orders, how many, what were they, if any, if paid, how much, and what money was used, &c., which was laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Currie the vote by which the Senate rejected the bill fixing the per diem and mileage of officers and members of the General Assembly at \$7 for speakers; \$5 for members; \$5 for Principal and Assistant Clerks; \$5 for Enrolling and Engrossing Clerks; \$5 for Doorkeeper and Assistant and 20 cents mileage in addition for the whole, was reconsidered.

John Hyman, (col.) called the previous question on the passage of the bill, which was sustained, and it passed by a vote of 31 to 13.

Latham, Linney, Moore and Hyman, (col.) On motion of Mr. Allen, the rules were suspended, and the bill to repeal an act entitled "an Act to secure the better protection of life and property," (Shofter bill) was taken up.

Mr. Moore spoke at some length in opposition to the bill. Mr. Jones called the previous question on its passage, which was sustained, and the bill passed its final reading by a vote of 31 to 7.

The following resolutions were taken up and disposed of as follows: Resolution requesting the Representatives of this State in Congress to use their influence to secure aid for the purpose of creating an educational fund from the sale of public lands was postponed till Tuesday next, and made a special order for that day.

Resolution proposing to raise a joint committee consisting of three from the Senate and five from the House to inquire into expediency of establishing three courts per year in each county, was adopted.

Resolution authorizing the General Assembly to take recess from and after the 23rd of December to the 11th of January, 1871.

Mr. Murphy called the previous question, which was sustained, and the resolution passed by a vote of 25 to 12.

Resolution in relation to a national system of public instruction, requesting the Representatives of this State in Congress to use their influence regarding such system.

On motion its consideration was postponed to Wednesday next.

Resolution instructing the Judiciary Committee to report a bill for the purpose of establishing a house of refuge for young convicts and to regulate the punishment of vagrants was rejected.

On motion of Mr. Dargass the bill to supply a deficiency in the treasury was taken up. [The bill authorizes the Treasurer to borrow \$180,000 of the dividend declared by the North Carolina Railroad Company.] The bill passed its second reading.

Resolution concerning appropriation for the Insane Asylum was adopted.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

SATURDAY, Dec. 10. A SPECIAL COMMUNICATION FOR THE election of officers for the ensuing Marine year, will be held at ST. JOHN'S HALL, THIS (TUESDAY) EVENING, at 7 o'clock.

By Mr. Jordan, from the Committee on Penal Institutions, submitted a report in regard to the communication of the Commissioners appointed to superintend the erection of the Penitentiary, and presenting a bill providing for the relief of the Penitentiary.

By Mr. Joyner, of Johnson: A bill to repeal section 16, chapter 137, laws of 1868-'69; referred.

On motion of Mr. Carson, the rules were suspended and the joint resolution taking a recess from the 23d of December, 1870, to the 10th of January, was taken up.

The previous question was called and the resolution passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 51, nays 25.

On motion of Mr. Justice, the rules were suspended and the resolution in regard to a recess was taken up and put on its third reading.

Mr. Johnston, of Buncombe, moved to amend by striking out the "10th of January" and insert the "26th of December;" lost.

Mr. Houston moved as amendment that the members and officers of the General Assembly do not receive any per diem during the recess. Mr. Carson accepted the amendment and the resolution passed its third reading.
