Illegal Registering. Wm. Jackson, colored, arrested on Saturday last on the charge of illegal registering, was arraigned before Justice McQuigg yesterday. It was proven that he had been absent from the city since May last, employed as a laborer in a neighboring State and that he had only returned here within the last ten days. The evidence being deemed sufficient by Justice McQuigg to warrant the commitment of the defendant for intentional fraud, he was required to give security in the sum of \$150 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court to answer the charge.

The Turpentine Stillman in Anson. We learn that a company has been organized at a point on the line of the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, in Anson county, styled the "Daniel's Company," for the purpose of entering extensively upon the business of turpentine making. A distillery has been erected at the place, which has been christened Martinsburg, and a large number of hands have been employed. The company expect in a short time to commence shipping twenty-five to thirty barrels of spirits per day, the product of their manufactory. This is the first time the business of turpentine making has been attempted in Anson, the facilities for retting it to market being the great obstacle to its success.

It reads as follows: "And they respectfully submit, that the Board of Commissioners have in law no power to review or control the action of the Trustees, and the complainant has mistaken his remedy. All of which is respectfully submitted."

A Terrible Affair. A melancholy affair occurred near Clinton, Sampson county, on last Monday night week, which was not only deplorable in its results, but has been the means of creating a great deal of excitement in the county. A young man by the name of David Fryar, very respectably connected, had lost a horse a short time previously and believed a certain colored man in the neighborhood guilty of the theft. On the evening in question he went to the house of the colored man alluded to and called to him to come out, and receiving no answer, he asked him if he had no ours; to which the colored man, who in the meantime had opened the door, made an insulting reply, whereupon Fryar struck him. At this his antagonist seized a piece of wood, knocked him down and beat him terribly about the head and body. Having been left in this condition, Fryar, as soon as he was able, went off, returning some time during the night in company with some five or six young men residing in the neighborhood. Approaching the house, they called for the colored man to come out, but not making his appearance they commenced firing into it, which finally resulted in his receiving a mortal wound in the abdomen. He was subsequently placed in the care of a physician, but the wound was of such a character that his skill was of no avail. He lingered until Tuesday of the present week when death relieved him of his sufferings. Warrants were issued for the arrest of the young men, all of whom belonged to the first families in the county, but at last accounts no arrests had been made. It is alleged by the friends of the parties who are said to have participated in the affair, that they simply went with young Fryar, knowing how desperate he was at the time, to prevent his getting into trouble, knowing that he would either kill his antagonist or be killed himself.

Deaths. Mr. Thomas J. Williams, formerly a merchant in this city, died of consumption yesterday. His funeral services take place at 3 o'clock this afternoon, at Front Street Methodist Church, and will be attended by the Masonic fraternity, who meet at their Lodge room at 2 P. Another Fraud. Wesley Cooper, colored, arrested on Tuesday on the charge of illegal registering, had a hearing before Justice McQuigg yesterday. In consequence of the inability of the Registrars to swear to his identity, the prisoner was discharged. But it was proven to the satisfaction of every one present that if Cooper had not registered fraudulently in the Fourth Ward, some scandal had taken advantage of Cooper's former residence in that Ward and registered by that name. The Wesley Cooper who did register claimed a residence on the very block and lot on which the prisoner formerly resided. There was gross fraud somewhere. Here Illegal Registering. George Hosler, a well known barber of this city, was arrested yesterday afternoon on the charge of illegal registering. It was alleged in his case that he had been absent from the city and State, in the pursuit of his vocation, in the neighborhood of eighteen months, returning here about two months ago. He was required to give bond in the sum of \$100 for his appearance on Friday morning, at 10 o'clock, before Justice McQuigg.

Board of Aldermen. An adjourned monthly meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held last night. The Committee on Fire Department, to whom was referred the petition of R. L. Harris, to be allowed to erect a shed on his premises on Toomer's alley, reported favorably, whereupon, said report was concurred in.

Petition of Alex. Oldham was referred to the Finance Committee, with power to act. The following order of the Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage was concurred in: That any person piling wood, or any other material, or merchandise, in such manner as to prevent, or obstruct, the fastening of vessels, at any piling or wharf placed upon any wharf, for the purpose of securing any vessel, shall forfeit \$5 for each hour said obstruction shall remain after notice from the Harbor Master; said fine to be collected in same manner as other fines imposed by this Board. Board adjourned to meet on Tuesday next, 10th inst.

A certain commission house in this city received from one of its correspondents in New York a day or two since, inclosed in a letter, the following little telegraphic item, clipped from the N. Y. Journal of Commerce of the 31st ult.: WILMINGTON, Dec. 30. Sprites turpentine firm at \$1.65; Crude Turpentine steady at \$2.00. Tar quiet at \$1.10. The correspondent very naturally wished to know what it meant. At the time this dispatch appeared on the streets of New York, the sprites turpentine market in this city was firm at 45 cents and tar was selling at \$1.50.
