County Commissioners.
The Board of County Commissioners met last evening. The following comprises all the business of any importance which was acted upon: In the matter of the Township Tax, imposed by the Board of Trustees, the following was the decision of the Board:
It is the pleasure of the Board that Messrs. McQuigg and Harris appear before the Board on Wednesday night to be interrogated in regard to the tax lately levied by the Township Board of Trustees of Wilmington Township, and that the Clerk of this Board notify the said parties of the same.
The Committee appointed to examine the books and vouchers of Ben. Leas, Jr., late Clerk of the Special Court, report that they examined the same on Thursday, the 6th inst., and found them correct and all bills accounted for by the proper vouchers.
The Committee to whom was referred the matter of working the convicts outside of the County Jail, House reports that they have made inquiry concerning the same and find that certain of the convicts have been employed at hard labor outside of the enclosure of the Work House, but find that they are not yet working in a body under a strong guard, and are regularly returned at night to the Work House, where they are locked up in other cells.
The Committee further report that in their opinion, the interest of the public is not prejudiced by this course of the keeper of the Work House, or the discipline of the prison, excepted thereby.

THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The Board of County Commissioners have asked our Representatives in the Legislature to secure the passage of an act enabling the Board to levy a special tax of \$300,000. Our Conservative members are strenuously opposed to the authority being given, but are willing to be controlled by the expressed wish of the tax-payers of the county. They therefore, in an expression of opinion by the tax-payers as to whether such authority should be conferred by the Legislature.
This tax is to be in addition to the ordinary county tax and is to pay debts, contracted by the old Board, who failed to itemize and publish their accounts as required by law.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.

Attention is called to the following Act of the General Assembly, viz.:
An Act to Prevent the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors on the Day of Election.
Section 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, That no person or persons shall sell any way in any public place, retail or wholesale, any intoxicating liquors, at any time next preceding or succeeding any election, or during the holding thereof, or during the day of election, or during the day following the day of election.
Sec. 2. That any person or persons violating the provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punishable with a fine of not less than one hundred and no more than one thousand dollars.
Sec. 3. That this Act shall be in force from and after the 15th day of August, A. D. 1869.
Persons dealing in spirituous liquors, within the city limits, or one mile thereof, are requested to take notice, as the law will be rigidly enforced.
