MESSAGE OF THE GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK.

Governor Hoffman, in his message to the Legislature of New York, counsels retrenchment in expenditures, and says the entire State debt is \$32,400,144, a reduction of \$8,445,804 during the year. He recommends that all the militia be armed with breech-loaders, and renewes his former recommendations as to canals, including an appropriation for a test of the various projected methods for the use of steam. He supports, guardedly, some plan for elevated railroads in New York, and asks for a continuation of the powers of the commission to prevent the spread of the cattle disease. He disapproves of the administration of the Federal finances, and gives some advice to Secretary Boutwell, and also accuses the Federal Government that is has assumed to interfere directly by its officers and armed forces with the election in New York. He arraigns the President on this account, and protests formally against these outrages.

THE NEGRO POPULATION—PER CENTAGE OF GAIN.

It appears from returns made to the Census Office that the colored population in one thousand and thirty counties for 1870, is one million five hundred and seventeen thousand and eleven. In 1860 the colored population in the same counties was one million four hundred and forty-one thousand and four hundred and two. The gain is not over four and one-half per cent., and leaving out the Northern States, included in the total, the gain would be less than three per cent.

OUTRAGES IN CHINA.

The Chinese outrages at Tien-Tsin, at which the Christian world was horrified not long ago, have been followed by similar brutal demonstrations against Protestant and Catholic missionaries in other parts of the kingdom. At Sin-Chow, for example, a Protestant chapel was sacked, and several Chinese converts murdered; a Catholic mission at Ta Tsuang shared the same fate; and one or more chapels between Pekin and Tien-Tsin are also reported to have been plundered and burned.

THE FORTY-SECOND CONGRESS.

Thus far the Democrats have gained forty members in the next Congress—making a change of eighty votes! The Radicals will not have more than about twenty-five majority in the next House of Representatives, and not a reliable one at that, in view of the new questions likely to arise before 1872. We hardly think Congress, in view of these facts, will attempt reconstruction again.

THE OLDEST PHYSICIAN.

"The Richmond and Louisville Medical Journal" says that the oldest practicing physician in America is Dr. Theophilus Clark, of Enfield, Vermont. He is ninety-eight years of age, has been practicing continuously for sixty-six years, is hale and hearty, and has no thought of giving up business yet.

PROPOSED ADMISSION OF NEW MEXICO.

The Governor of New Mexico is now in Washington to urge the admission of that Territory as a State. He says it is entitled to a representative in Congress by the increased population shown in the census returns.

CHINESE GONE HOME.

All the Chinese in the United States had the means have gone home to celebrate, in February, the commencement of another thousand years. They declare the last festival of thanksgiving was celebrated in China ten centuries ago.

In 1870 the President's Message was passed over the ten Western Union Wires between Washington and New York a little over an hour and to Boston in a little more time. Forty years ago the following feat was performed on horseback with a President's message. The express which brought President Jackson's Message was only 44 hours from New York to New Haven. The rider, from Stratford, to New Haven, 144 miles, performed the distance with one horse, in 41 minutes. From New Haven to Hartford, 84 miles, in one hour and fifty-four minutes. From Hartford to Worcester, 60 miles, in three hours and 45 minutes; from Worcester to Boston, 40 miles in two hours and 28 minutes; 47 miles and 40 minutes from New Haven to Boston, distance 54 miles, in 11 hours and 59 minutes from New York to Boston, distance 210 miles.

Captain Travers, of Rochester, N. Y., has made a wager of \$25 that he will, at the distance of thirty-six feet, with a pistol, shoot from the top of a wine bottle, a cork on which is placed a bullet, dropping the bullet into the bottle and not breaking the bottle. He has twelve shots, and engages to perform the feat four times.
