Another Horrible Murder in Robeson County-Henry Berry Lowrey Again on the War Path-The Victim a

Prominent Citizen. Intelligence was received here yesterday afternoon of the perpetration of another horrible murder in Robeson county, and this time by the leader of the gang of outlaws who have so long infested that county-no less a personage, in fact, than Henry Berry Lowrey himse-L. Our informant, who came down on the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad yesterday afternoon, gives us the following particulars: Mr. John Taylor, who resided at Moss Neck, while on his way from his house to the store lately occupied by him, and in company with a man by the name of McNiell, yesterday morning, about 9 o'clock, was suddenly fired upon, the ball entering the right side of his bead, passing entirely through and coming out on the other side. He fell and almost instantly expired. The deceased and Mr. McNiell were walking on the bank of the mill-dam at the time, and the latter gentleman distinctly saw the party, who had been previously concealed from their view, when he raised and fired upon his vic tim, and he was certain that the perpetrator was no other than Henry Berry Lowrey. He was accompanied, however, by two others of the gang, all of whom made a precipitous retreat as soon as the deed was .secomplished. The place where the murder was committed was only a short distance from where the mulatto, Sanderson, was killed some time since, and for whose death the outlaws were sworn to be revenged. Mr. Taylor was known by them to have taken some part in the efforts that have been made for their capture, and hence their determination to kill him. He had been carrying on quite an extensive business at Moss Neck; but latterly he had offered his property for sale with the intention of leaving that vicinity, on account of the known hostility of the gang towards him and the liability which he knew he incarred of being at any moment sacrificed to their desire for vengeance. He had already disposed of his store and some other property and at the time of his death was conducting a distillery. A squad of U. S. troops were only about two hundred yards from the scene lot
