SPECIAL ORDER. The consideration of the special order, upon motion, was postponed until Friday at 11 o'clock.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS. Mr. Flemming, appointing joint Committee. Lies over one day.

Mr. Love, asked that bill in relation to the Western Turnpike Road, be taken up. It was done, and upon motion, was postponed for further consideration until Saturday next.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS. Bill on salaries and fees of State officers was taken up and passed its several readings. It provides that the private secretary of the Governor shall receive a salary of \$500 per annum, messenger for Governat \$1,500, and one assistant clerk at \$750; Secretary of State \$1,000; clerk \$800; Auditor \$1,250; Superintendent of Public Instruction, \$1,500, with no assistant or travelling expenses; Attorney General, \$1,500, and fees and allowances; Adjutant General \$300; Reporter for Supreme Court, same pay as now allowed by Revised Code; Solicitors of several districts \$20 for each term of Superior Court they shall attend.
