After the rejection of one or two other amendments to other sections, the bill passed its third reading. On motion of Mr. Harris, of Franklin, the bill to amend section 1, chapter 168, laws 1868-'69, in regard to official bonds, was taken up and passed its third reading.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY, We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the report in the Sentinel: THURSDAY, Feb. 9, 1871. Nothing of interest transpired in the Senate. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. THURSDAY, Feb. 9, 1871.

Mr. Withers presented a memorial from certain citizens of Caswell county in regard to provisions forcibly taken from them by Kirk, and asking pay therefor. The memorial was appropriately disposed of.

Mr. Ashe presented a memorial from certain citizens of Wilmington asking the abolishment of the Special Court of that city. The memorial was read and appropriately referred.

Mr. Johnston, of Buncombe, presented an additional article of impeachment against W. W. Holden. The article reads as follows: ARTICLE IX. That the said William W. Holden, Governor of the State of North Carolina, unfaithful to the duties of his office, and the interests of the State, did, on or about the 9th day of June, A. D. 1869, wilfully, corruptly, and unlawfully, in violation of his oath of office, and under color of his said office, and conspiring with one George W. Sweeney and other evil-disposed persons to defraud the State of North Carolina, sign and issue, as President ex officio, of the Board of Internal Improvements, an order directing the Treasurer of the State to subscribe, on behalf of the State, the sum of two millions six hundred and sixty six thousand dollars, and to issue bonds of the State to that amount to the Western Division of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, although the said W. W. Holden, Governor as aforesaid, well knew that the President of said Railroad Company had not, as was required by law, certified to said Board of Internal Improvements that "solvent individuals, corporations, companies or contractors," had subscribed to the capital stock of said Company a sufficient amount to authorize the issuing of said sum of two millions six hundred and sixty six thousand dollars, and that five per cent thereof had been paid in cash, as was required by law.

And the said William W. Holden, Governor as aforesaid, in further disregard of his said oath of office and the interests of the people of the State, and conspiring with one George W. Sweeney and other evil-disposed persons to wrong and defraud the State of North Carolina, did, as President, ex officio, of the Board of Internal Improvements, sign and issue the order to the Treasurer of the State directing him to subscribe, on behalf of the State, the sum of four million of dollars, and to issue bonds of the State to that amount, and deliver them to the President of the Western Division of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, when the said William W. Holden, Governor as aforesaid, well knew that the certificate made to said Board of Internal Improvements by George W. Sweeney, President of said Railroad, "that one million, six hundred and ninety-two thousand dollars had been subscribed by solvent individuals, corporations, &c., to the capital stock of said Railroad Company, and that five per cent thereof had been paid in cash," as required by law, was false and fraudulent, and was made by said G. W. Sweeney, President as aforesaid, in furtherance of the wicked and unlawful designs of the said G. W. Sweeney, W. W. Holden, Governor as aforesaid, and others to wrong and defraud the good people of this State; whereby the said William W. Holden, Governor as aforesaid, has brought his said office of Governor into contempt and was then and there, in manner and form as aforesaid, guilty of misconduct in office, and of high crimes and misdemeanors in office against the Constitution and laws of said State and against the peace, dignity and interests thereof.

Mr. Robinson offered a resolution referring the article to the Committee on Articles of Impeachment, with power to send for persons and papers. The resolution and the article, according to the rules were placed upon the calendar.
