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## LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY

We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the report in the Sentinel:  
**SENATE.**  
FRIDAY, Feb. 10, 1871.  
Mr. Murphy called up bill concerning working on public roads. Rules were suspended and bill taken up.  
It imposes a fine of from \$3 to \$5 for all who are liable to work on roads and shall willfully refuse so to do.  
On third reading.  
Mr. Merrimon moved to postpone until to-night at 7 P. M., and make it a special order for that hour. Prevalled.  
Mr. Cowles, a bill requiring the Secretary of State to keep in his office a record of all land grants issued since the organization of the State and of which there may be any record in his office, referred.  
Mr. Merrimon moved to concur in the amendments of the House to the bill concerning the W. N. C. R. Concurred in.  
Mr. Merrimon moved to reconsider that vote and to lay that motion on the table. Prevalled.  
Hour arrived for the sitting of the Senate as a Court of Impeachment.  
After adjournment of Court, President Warren called the Senate to order.  
**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.**  
FRIDAY, Feb. 10, 1871.  
Mr. Powell, from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, Mr. Henderson, from the Committee on Corporations, Mr. Luckey, from the Committee on Insane, Asylum, Mr. Rankin, from Committee on Propositions and Grievances and Mr. Hill, from the Committee on the Library, submitted reports.  
By Mr. Tomlinson: A resolution concerning the Deaf and Dumb Asylum; placed on calendar.  
By the same: A bill appropriating \$89,000 for defraying the expenses of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum for the current fiscal year; referred.  
By Mr. Dickey: A bill to incorporate the Georgia and North Carolina R. R.; referred.  
By Mr. McCauley: A bill concerning the dower of married women; referred.  
**UNFINISHED BUSINESS.**  
Bill to lay off and establish the County of Swain, (out of portions of Macon and Jackson Counties.) The bill passed its second reading.  
The yeas and nays were called and the bill passed its third reading by a vote of yeas 57, nays 19.  
Mr. Ashe, from the Committee on Enrolled Bills, reported several bills and resolutions as being correctly enrolled.  
**SPECIAL ORDER.**  
Resolution in favor of M. A. Bledsoe (allowing him some \$5,000 for supplies furnished to inmates of the Insane Asylum just before the close of the war.)  
After a long debate, Mr. Justice moved to lay the matter on the table. The yeas and nays were called and the motion was rejected by a vote of yeas 26, nays 32.  
Mr. Ashe offered an amendment not allowing any interest; failed for want of a quorum.  
Mr. Hargrove moved to postpone indefinitely; lost.  
Mr. Waring moved to postpone until Wednesday next; adopted.  
A message was received from the Governor, transmitting a communication from the Adjutant General in regard to the employment of spies, detectives &c.  
On motion of Mr. Jordan, the message together with the documents were referred to a special Committee of 5.  
[The communications from the Adjutant General came in the shape of a large bundle of papers to which a reference was asked.]  
**CALENDAR.**  
Bill to authorize the lawful voters of each judicial district to elect their own Judge of the Superior Court was taken up and on motion of Mr. Rankin, was indefinitely postponed.  
Bill to incorporate the Spartanburg and Rutherford R. R. Co. was taken up, amended and passed its several readings.
