THE HOLDEN IMPEACHMENT. Brutality of Kirk and His Non-A Curious Chaplain—A Supplemental Convention Bill—Caldwell's Impeachment Probable.

RALEIGH, Feb. 15. The witnesses from Caswell county and the victims of Kirk were examined in the Court of Impeachment to-day. Among them the Hon. S. P. Hill, former Speaker of the House of Commons; Hon. John Kerr, and W. B. Bove, former member of the Legislature from that county. All testified to the violent and outrageous conduct of Kirk and his men while in Yanceyville. Mr. Bove related the brutal manner in which his arrest was effected—how he was dragged down the steps of the court room by main force and beaten about the body all the time that was being done. Mr. Bove is about sixty years of age, and one of the most esteemed men in Caswell.

Hon. S. P. Hill testified to the ill treatment which he received when arrested, and stated that Yates, Kirk's Major, placed a loaded pistol at his head and cursed and abused him.

All of these witnesses testified especially to the violent conduct of Reverend Yates, who was both major and chaplain of the regiment. They described his conduct as fiendish, and his oaths and demonstrations as numerous and fearful.

It is now thought, that the Legislature will pass a supplemental bill, with a convention act, providing that the Speakers of the two Houses shall issue the election proclamation, and in the meantime take steps to impeach Caldwell.—Telegram to Norfolk Journal.

Plenty of shad in the Newbern market. The Tarboro' Carolinian is to be resumed to-day.

The people of Charlotte are beside themselves with joy at the prospect of the speedy completion of a new pavement on one of the streets of that city.

We learn from the New York Observer that a colony of 3,000 persons, many of them Jersey men, has been formed to go to Western North Carolina, having purchased a large tract of land there, valued at \$500,000.

The New York Herald says: Two of the witnesses in the impeachment trial of Governor Holden in North Carolina have admitted being members of the Ku Klux. We believe they are the only well authenticated specimens that have ever been presented in proper form to the general public.
