Weather Report.
Office of Chief Signal Officer,
Washington, March 4—4:35 P. M.
The following is a synopsis of the weather reports for the past 24 hours:
The barometer which was falling over the country yesterday, showed a decided minimum from New Jersey to Virginia, and a more decided one over the State of Maine. These areas of low pressure have moved respectively eastward and north-eastward. The lowest barometer 29.80 is now found from 1 to 300 miles east of Long Island. Light rains and snow prevail on the adjacent coasts. Elsewhere the weather is clear and fair, excepting the eastern States, which are still covered with clouds. The pressure has risen on the South Atlantic and has varied on the Gulf and Lakes. Cloudy and threatening weather is reported from the Rocky Mountain Stations and the low barometer continues without material change in the northeast. Light and fresh winds have very generally prevailed.

SATURDAY, March 4.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.
We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the report in the *Sentinel*:
SENATE.
FRIDAY, March 3, 1871.
On motion of Mr. Cowles, the bill for the suppression of secret political societies, was made special order for Monday at 7 P. M.
Mr. Norment, a bill to regulate appeals in capital cases; referred.
Mr. Merrimon introduced a question of privilege and stated that he had introduced a bill about the 1st of January relative to the prevention of the sale of spirituous liquor to confirmed inebriates, which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. It had not been reported upon.
Mr. Jones, for Committee, stated that he had a distant recollection that the bill was before the Committee, and it was decided to report upon it adversely. He had no doubt the bill had been misplaced.
Mr. Edwards, from Judiciary Committee, reported a bill to abolish the Special Court of the city of Wilmington: calendar.
Mr. Morehead, from Committee on Internal Improvements, reported favorably upon bill concerning better protection of life on railroads: calendar.
Mr. Troy, a bill chartering the Pungo River Swamp Manufacturing Company.

Referred to Committee on Claims.
Message from the House informing the Senate of the passage of a bill making appropriation for witnesses on behalf of Gov. Holden.
Mr. Worth moved a suspension of the rules to put the bill on its passage. Pre-arranged, and the bill passed its several readings.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.
Bill to incorporate the North Western North Carolina Railroad with the North Carolina Railroad being the unfinished business its consideration was resumed.
The question occurred on the motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill failed to pass its third reading on yesterday. The motion was put, and failed by a vote of yeas 37, nays 58.

CALENDAR.
Bill to incorporate the Yanceyville, Danville and Coalfield Railroad was taken up and passed its several readings.
Bill to authorize the Commissioners of Harnett county to levy a special tax was taken up and passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 68, nays 5.
The Chair announced Messrs. Hargrove, Henderson and Kealey as the House branch of the special Committee to examine into the State's interest in the Cape Fear Navigation Company.
